Information about this children's home

This children's home is operated by a private company. The home is registered to provide care for up to three children who have difficulty in managing their emotions and behaviour. The registered manager left in December 2019. A new manager has been appointed and is in the process of registering with Ofsted.

This inspection

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged requires improvement to be good at the last full inspection. At the interim inspection, Ofsted judges that it has improved effectiveness.

The home closed for two months in 2019, following a period of difficult and complex behaviours, to enable the staff to regroup and to undertake repairs to the home. The registered manager left in December 2019 and a new manager was appointed.

The new manager has worked hard to reflect on lessons learned, to develop the new staff team and to develop systems and processes to improve the quality of care and children's experiences. She has met the recommendation and four of the six requirements that were raised at the full inspection.

The manager is tenacious in chasing social workers for information and updates. She has been thorough in her follow-up of information before accepting new admissions and forensic in her consideration of information. The manager has refused several placements because she is clear that the home cannot meet some children's needs. This demonstrates a child-centred approach and integrity and honesty.

The manager visited a child before their admission and visited the previous placement of another child to enable good preparation for their moves into the home. She has implemented risk-reduction measures and provided a strong response to fire-setting behaviour. The manager has demonstrated learning from placements that have ended, with in-depth analysis of practice and lessons to take forward. In addition, she has worked with her staff to ensure that they retain contact with children who have moved on. Clear records evidence the lengths that the staff go to so that those children who have moved on know that the staff continue to care about them.

The manager and staff are diligent in their pursuit of education placements for the children. The staff support the children with GCSE coursework and encourage them to undertake education-based activities while a formal education provision is sought. The staff encourage children's interests and ambitions by providing the resources that the children need. One child expressed an interest in barbering, so the staff purchased a mannequin head and a barber's kit so that he can practise and develop his skills.

The staff work with the children to develop their independence skills. The staff target specific aspects of independence that are relevant to each child. Work includes developing cooking and budgeting skills, mindfulness and healthy relationships. The organisation uses an accredited programme so that children's achievements are recognised and valued.



Except for the manager, who was previously the deputy manager, the other staff are new in post since the last inspection. Some staff have social work qualifications and all staff are enrolled on a level 5 diploma. The manager has worked hard to develop her team and to provide a good level of support. However, a consistent staff team is not yet embedded and the staff are not yet qualified, so this requirement is repeated.

The manager has updated the location risk assessment to include information on crime statistics, anti-social behaviour and local gang activity. She has added risk-reduction measures and worked with other relevant professionals to gain a full picture of local risks.

Complaints are managed well and within timescales. Missing-from-care incidents are managed well. The staff actively search for children when they go missing. The manager is persistent in her requests to social workers to provide children with return home interviews so that the children can speak with someone outside of the home about these incidents. The children also can talk with staff and reflect on their behaviour. Regular key-work sessions give the children opportunities to explore their feelings and concerns and to look at alternative coping strategies. The staff also reflect on the reasons that a child may go missing and what support can be offered.

Since the last inspection, some notifications to Ofsted have been delayed and others have not been made at all. Failure to provide timely notifications prevents Ofsted from having a current and accurate view of how well children are safeguarded.
