## What is it like to attend this early years setting?

#### This provision meets requirements

The manager leads the club with enthusiasm, dedication and a commitment to continually improve and introduce exciting new ideas. She has high expectations of both staff and children. This leads to a very well-run club, where children have fun and take part in a wide range of interesting activities.

Children happily and confidently enter the club. They are courteous in their interactions with each other as they thank another child for holding the door open. They gain awards for politeness and use of good manners. Children behave exceptionally well. Older children are early years helpers to mentor younger children and support them to become familiar with the routines. Rules are drawn up in conjunction with all children and they sign a behaviour contract to agree to a code of conduct. This helps children to learn to be respectful, considerate and tolerant of others.

The club holds an inclusion friendly award and children show care and concern for each other. Children learn to keep themselves safe. For example, they are encouraged to complete a risk assessment for everyone before going outdoors to ensure all areas are free from any hazards.

# What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Children engage very well with the wealth of exciting activities available. They take part in risky play as they wear goggles and use hammers to break the ice and release the candy canes. Children enjoy mindfulness sessions where they relish opportunities to make dream jars and relax using different techniques. They develop their small physical skills as they make Christmas decorations from cork mats. Children concentrate hard as they use glue spreaders competently and scissors with ease and purpose.
- Partnerships with parents are excellent. Parents say, 'It is fantastic, and my children love coming to club' and 'staff are great about safety'. They say that they feel well informed about what happens in the club. Staff work with parents to deal with all children's individual needs in a sensitive manner, so there is consistency between club, home and school. Children say that they really enjoy drawing, colouring and playing with their friends.
- To encourage reading and children's enjoyment of books the club has introduced 'author of the week'. Children can sit and read books with their friends in the book area. Visitors are invited into the club, so children learn about the wider community and different occupations. For example, a nurse visited the club and children learned about a pulse oximeter, a stethoscope and a thermometer. A hearing dog was also brought into the club to help children to recognise how



dogs can help people who do not hear very well.

- Staff work well with class teachers to ensure that they know about the curriculum that children are following in school, so they can complement this learning in the club. They plan activities based on children's ideas and interests. For example, children showed an interest in stick insects, so staff brought these into the club and children were able to care for them. Staff send termly reports through to class teachers, so they are aware of what children are doing while in the club.
- Children make choices and very much have their voice heard. Older children can become members of the club council and ask other children for their views and ideas of what they want to see in the club. Due to space restrictions, a resource book is in place, so that children know what toys and resources are available. Children put their suggestions into an envelope the day before, so they can choose what they wish to be available the following day.
- Staff access a course each month to help to enhance their professional development. Some staff have recently attended a course on handling children's behaviour. This has led to staff feeling reassured about appropriate strategies and being more confident when talking with children about any minor issues.

### Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

The manager ensures that staff keep their safeguarding knowledge up to date by attending regular child protection training. Staff have a good knowledge of safeguarding issues and wider safeguarding matters. They know the signs to be concerned about in relation to child protection and who to contact if they a have a concern about a child's well-being. Children designed anti-bullying posters in the club, to complement activities in school linked to anti-bullying week. Staff also spoke with children about what to do if they were being bullied.
