Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a very secure understanding of her role in safeguarding children. She is confident with regard to the signs of abuse and the procedures to follow if she has any concerns about their welfare. Additionally, the childminder knows how to manage possible allegations against herself and other adults. She fully understands her duty to protect children.
- The childminder has procedures to complete daily risk assessments of her house and garden, and any outings with the children. She recognises her duty to keep children safe and to teach them about personal safety.
- The childminder has a suitable understanding of the learning and development requirements. She knows the importance of regular observations and assessments of children's skills. She explains how she plans activities that challenge them and boost their personal development.
- The childminder offers a well-organised environment for children to play. She provides a broad range of toys and resources to promote their interests and learning. The childminder understands the importance of a good balance of adult-led and child-initiated play opportunities across all areas of learning. This helps to prepare children for school.
- The childminder understands how to manage children's behaviour in a positive way. She provides children with ongoing opportunities for social interaction with other children to help them make friends. The childminder knows that she must work with parents to help children understand their own feelings.
- The childminder knows how to develop good partnerships with parents and other settings that children may attend. She understands the importance of ensuring that she supports children's personal needs and learning.
- The childminder understands the importance of teaching children about healthy lifestyles. She has developed routines that ensure that children spend time in the fresh air, exercising and playing. She works with parents to plan meals and to ensure that children learn about the importance of drinking water and eating nutritious food.
- The childminder understands how to evaluate her practice to help improve the quality of the provision for children. She is highly qualified and very eager to attend training to develop her skills and knowledge. The childminder discusses how she works with parents to ask for their views and suggestions. She also listens to children's views in order to improve her service.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
