Summary of key findings

This provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder is committed to partnership working. She understands the importance of working closely with parents in order to meet children's needs. For example, she has procedures in place to collect detailed information from parents when children start at her setting.
- The childminder understands the importance of promoting a healthy lifestyle. She explains how she plans a range of heathy meals and takes children outside every day for fresh air and exercise.
- The childminder holds a current first-aid certificate and valid public liability insurance. She is aware of the importance of providing a safe learning environment for children. She understands how to undertake risk assessments and minimise hazards to children.
- The childminder understands how to manage children's behaviour positively. She explains the strategies she uses to help children play cooperatively. For example, she describes how she uses a timer to support their turn taking.
- The childminder undertakes regular safeguarding training. Despite this, she does not sufficiently understand the different types of abuse and how to identify when a child may be at risk of harm. The childminder does not understand her responsibilities under the 'Prevent' duty and how to recognise that a child is at risk of radicalisation.
- The childminder plans a broad curriculum. She focuses on improving her knowledge of how children learn. She undertakes regular training to enhance her teaching skills.
- The childminder demonstrates how she uses information gained from her observations to identify children's learning needs. She describes how she plans meaningful activities, such as cooking, to build upon what children already know.
- The childminder understands how to prevent the spread of infection. However, she does not possess a clear understanding of the requirement to record the administration of children's medications. Consequently, children's health is at risk.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:
