Information about this children's home

The children's home is owned and managed by a sole provider. It provides care and accommodation for up to three children whose plan is for them to live in medium- to long-term residential care.

Inspection date: 9 June 2020

This monitoring visit

This was an urgent monitoring inspection to assess the safety of the children.

Children's risk assessments do not include all their known risks. These do not provide staff with clear information on how to manage and reduce the risks to children's safety and welfare. The details of strategies in place to manage children's risks are spread between two documents. This is confusing for staff and means that they may not use the most effective approaches to keep children safe.

Staff do not appropriately supervise children. This means that they do not always identify or act on signs that children are at risk of harm. For example, children are able to repeatedly purchase alcohol without staff knowledge.

The manager does not always take effective action when there is a serious concern about a child's welfare. He does not ensure that the staff follow risk management strategies. For example, children access the internet through their electronic devices. Staff do not monitor these devices as required by children's risk assessments. Consequently, children continue to access inappropriate material online. The manager does not work in partnership with other agencies or professionals to agree changes to the children's risk assessments.

Staff do not receive suitable training to make sure that they have the necessary skills to identify and manage children's risks. For example, only one member of staff has

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completed training in relation to keeping children safe online. This failure places children at risk of harm.

Staff do not act consistently to prevent children's behaviours having a negative impact on each other. For example, some children copy the self-harming behaviours of others. This is detrimental to their progress and development.

Staff do not appropriately manage relationships between children to prevent them from harming each other. Children regularly argue with each other and cause disruption in the home and in the local community. The manager does not ensure that staff work with children to help them to understand how to keep themselves safe. This means that children remain at risk of harm.

ensure that staff have the experience, qualifications and skills to meet the needs of each child; and	



use monitoring and review systems to make continuous improvements in the quality of care provided in the home. (Regulation 13(1)(a)(b)(2)(c)(h))

Recommendations

■ Staff should be familiar with the home's policies on record keeping and understand the importance of careful, objective, and clear recording. Staff should record information on individual children in a non-stigmatising way that distinguishes between fact, opinion and third-party information. Information about the child must always be recorded in a way that will be helpful to the child. ('Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards', page 62, paragraph 14.4) Specifically, the registered provider should ensure that any follow-up actions to speak to children and young people about issues of concern are undertaken.
