Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This children's home is owned and managed by a private organisation. It is registered for up to three children aged between 11 and 17 years who have experienced adverse childhood experiences that have led to associated trauma and complex behaviours.

The manager has been registered with Ofsted since May 2020. She has the necessary qualifications for the role.

This monitoring visit

During the current COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic, Ofsted is not carrying out routine inspections of social care provision.

This on-site inspection was undertaken because of whistle-blowing concerns about safeguarding practices, and management oversight within the home. A complaint has also been received about loud music being played. No grading was given at this inspection.

The home is decorated to a high standard and has been painted throughout since the last inspection. New furniture has been purchased including, bedroom furniture, a new dining table and sofa. The home is clean and welcoming.

Children shared with the inspector that they like living at this home and are happy. Staff ensure that their bedrooms are comfortable and personalised. Children did not raise any concerns about the care they receive from staff. Children appear to have warm relationships with staff.

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Social workers did not share any significant concerns relating to the safety of children at this home. They provided positive feedback about the progress children have made with their independence and behaviours.

One child has moved in since the last inspection and is settling in well. The child is attending education daily. The child is supported to spend time with family in the local area to ensure they maintain their personal relationships. However, staff do not show enough professional curiosity about where children are spending their time and who with. Action is required to address this weakness to ensure that the children's safety is prioritised.

The other child living at the home is not given enough help from staff to improve their routine and to access educational activities in readiness for attending a local college in September. This child spends long periods in bed during the day and requires more support than is currently being given in order to change this pattern of behaviour. The child does not yet have an education, health and care (EHC) plan in place to ensure their support needs are met. This could hinder their educational development if it is not in place.

Staff are not all clear about their responsibilities to support children's well-being. The children living here have started a relationship and they often stay up until the early hours together unsupervised. Staff have not ensured that the children go to sleep and have a healthy routine. Behaviour management plans and risk assessments do not include clear actions to reduce these behaviours and minimise the risks to the children. This could hinder children's development.

Children are encouraged to eat healthily and are supported with accessing a balanced diet and exercise. However, staff have not supported them well enough to access information and services in relation to sexual health. Staff have not helped children to understand healthy relationships. This could mean that children are at risk of pregnancy or sexually transmitted infections.

A number of staff have left since the last inspection, including the registered manager and responsible individual. The dynamics within the current team are fractured and dysfunctional. Communication between staff and the new registered manager needs to improve to ensure the team provides consistent care for children. This could impact on the progress of children if it is not addressed.

There have been four minor complaints recorded since the last inspection. The issues raised in the complaints were reviewed as part of this inspection and Ofsted is satisfied that these have been managed appropriately by the registered manager and responsible individual. Effective action has been taken in response to the concerns.

What does the children's home need to do to improve? Recommendations

■ As set out in regulations 31-33, the registered person is responsible for maintaining good employment practice. They must ensure that recruitment, supervision and performance management of staff safeguards children and minimises potential risks to them.

- To establish whether an existing qualification is equivalent to either the Level 3 Diploma for Residential Childcare; and/ or the Level 5 Diploma in Leadership and Management for Residential Childcare, the registered person should check whether the existing qualification has appeared in previous children's homes legislation or National Minimum Standards.
- In addition, the registered person should also establish whether the units completed in the candidate's original qualification have content which corresponds with the units of the Level 3 Diploma for Residential Childcare; and/ or the Level 5 Diploma in Leadership and Management for Residential Childcare. They should consider the relevance of the units of any original qualifications to the care of children as described in the homes Statement of Purpose.
