Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This service is operated by a private provider and is registered to provide care and accommodation for two children who have learning disabilities.

The interim manager of the home has applied for registration.

Inspection date: 16 July 2020

This monitoring visit

This children's home was judged inadequate on 10 March 2020 for the second time. A notice restricting accommodation was issued following the monitoring visit on 2 June 2020.

Following this monitoring visit, one recommendation and nine out of the 10 requirements were met. The notice restricting accommodation was removed and a compliance notice was issued in respect of regulation 32.

Inspectors conducted this monitoring visit remotely to comply with government guidance regarding the COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic.

Staff recruitment practice is still not good. Inspectors found that on one occasion, the reference provided in relation to a staff member does not match the employment history on their application. In addition, the reference was sought after the member of staff started working at the home. Inspectors also found that some staff recruitment files do not include a full employment history and gaps in employment are not discussed at interview. This continuous shortfall in recruitment practice has the potential to compromise young people's safety.

Leaders and managers have a clear escalation process in place. Staff challenge services when their performance or response is not good enough. As a result, staff

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now have access to statutory documents that are essential in supporting the care of the young person.

Staff take young people's wishes and feelings into account. As a result, young people are more confident to express their views and feelings and are listened to.

Feedback from professionals is largely positive. Staff are better supported through supervisions and team meetings to understand the new monitoring tools. As a result, staff are now better able to monitor the young person's progress and needs.

The manager has revised the statement of purpose. For example, information relating to the rapeutic services has been updated. This review by the manager ensures that the statement of purpose reflects what the home is offering and is no longer misleading.

The responsible individual seeks support from others outside of the organisation to develop his own learning. While his learning remains ongoing, the responsible individual is able to evidence his learning in practice by his influence in the home. For example, staff have noted an increased presence and support for their development. Random quality assurance visits by the responsible individual help him to keep updated and assured that staff are working in line with new monitoring systems that help to assess the quality of care.

The independent visitor provides monthly reports that include her assessment about whether young people are effectively safeguarded, and their well-being promoted. This report is now provided to staff to read and learn from.

Leaders and managers have reviewed the quality of care and a written report has been provided to Ofsted. The report has identified actions, and consultations with others have been made and included in the report. This review of the quality of care ensures that feedback received is acted on to improve the service.

The manager has consulted with relevant people to inform the location risk assessment. As a result, the review of the location of the home and what risks may be presented is clear.

The children's guide is user friendly and now includes information about how young people can complain if they are unhappy.
