Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This home was previously owned by the local authority. It was re-registered in October 2019 when the local authority moved to be a holding company. It is registered for up to eight children who have suffered adverse childhood experiences that have led to associated trauma and presenting complex behaviours, as well as for children who have learning disabilities and/or autism spectrum disorder.

The manager registered with Ofsted in October 2019 and holds a NVQ level 4 in leadership and management.

This monitoring visit

On 1 and 4 May 2020, Ofsted carried out a remote monitoring inspection of the home. Following this visit, three compliance notices were issued under regulations 12, 13 and 14 of the Children's Homes (England) Regulations 2015.

On 2 and 3 June 2020, Ofsted carried out an on-site inspection to review the progress that had been made in meeting the three compliance notices. Ofsted found significant shortfalls, which resulted in Ofsted making the decision to suspend the home's registration from 5 June 2020 until 27 August 2020 and to issue a further two compliance notices.

A further monitoring visit was conducted on 15 and 16 July 2020 to evaluate whether the provider has complied with the suspension notice and met the two compliance notices.

Ofsted carried out this inspection remotely. The inspectors gathered evidence by talking to the responsible individual, who provided electronic documents for the inspectors to review.

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This visit found that the provider has complied with the suspension notice and met the two compliance notices.

Senior managers have developed an action plan. This plan is in the early stages of implementation and currently the suspension notice remains in place.

Children's personal possessions have now been moved from the home and returned to them.

There are plans in place to help to address shortfalls in staff's knowledge and skills. For example, some members of staff have recently received training to help them understand the needs of children who have a diagnosis of having Pica.

Complaints made by children have been investigated. However, records still do not fully capture the process, including how the outcome is reached, or any learning that has taken place. As a result, the management monitoring system is still not yet effective in making sure that the child's voice is reflected in the process.

The remaining requirements were not assessed at the monitoring visit and will be reviewed at a future inspection.
