

Compliance action taken for childcare provision

Summary of outcome

Her Majesty's Chief Inspector of Education, Children's Services and Skills is leading Ofsted's work into how regulated early years and childcare providers in England have delivered childcentred practice and care within the context of the restrictions placed on society during the COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic.

All early years providers must meet the legal requirements in the Statutory framework for the early years foundation stage. If we find that a provider is not meeting the requirements, we can take action to ensure they put matters right.

On 30 April 2019, we carried out an inspection and found the provider was not meeting some of these requirements. The overall effectiveness of the provision was judged to be requires improvement. The inspection report sets out the actions the provider was asked to take to meet the requirements.

On 21 October 2020, while routine inspections were suspended, we carried out an interim visit. The focus of the visit was to check whether the provider had met the safeguarding and welfare actions raised at their last inspection.

We found that the provider has put appropriate measures in place to ensure performance management arrangements help staff to improve their teaching practice.

Additionally, during the visit, we found new areas of concern. This means that the provider was not meeting other requirements as set out in the Statutory framework for the early years foundation stage.

In relation to the new areas of concern, we have served a welfare requirements notice. This



is a legal notice that requires the provider to take the actions below within the timescales set out. The provider will be able to give parents further information about this. The provider is still registered with Ofsted.

Actions needed by 16 November 2020

provide Ofsted with all the required information in a timely manner to enable all suitability checks to be completed for all members of the committee.

ensure that the lead practitioner for safeguarding responds appropriately to the possible signs of abuse or neglect

have regard to the government's statutory guidance 'Working Together to Safeguard Children 2018'; and, where there are concerns about a child's safety or welfare, or allegations of abuse are received, notify statutory agencies without delay.

We will monitor the provider's response to ensure the actions are successfully completed.

We monitored the welfare requirement notice and found that the provider had taken appropriate measures to meet the actions. The provider has taken appropriate actions to ensure suitability checks are completed for all committee members and the designated person for safeguarding has improved their knowledge and understanding of child protection procedures and fully understands their responsibilities.

We are satisfied the provider has met the safeguarding and welfare actions raised. The provider is still registered with Ofsted.

Publication of compliance action

We aim to ensure that the welfare of children and young people is protected in the services we regulate. The Childcare Act 2006 and accompanying regulations set out our responsibilities to regulate childminders and childcare providers. This includes the



enforcement powers we have in relation to those registered providers who do not comply with the requirements for registration.

We publish details of any actions we take, or the childminder or childcare provider takes to bring about compliance with requirements on our website for a period of five years.
