Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This local authority children's home provides care for up to 12 children with sensory impairment, learning disabilities, emotional and/or behavioural difficulties and/or physical disabilities. There are currently four children living at the home.

This monitoring visit

This monitoring visit took place because Ofsted has been made aware of concerns about the management of the home, the quality of care provided to children and staff conduct.

The inspector was aware during this visit that child protection allegations were being investigated by the appropriate authorities. While Ofsted does not have the power to investigate allegations of this kind, actions taken by the setting in response to the allegations were considered alongside other evidence available at the time of the visit to inform the inspector's judgements.

Poor practice had developed among the staff team. This had gone unnoticed or unchallenged by the management team.

Medication systems are poor. There have been errors in the administration, storage and recording of children's medication. In some cases, these errors had potentially very serious consequences. For example, weaknesses in practice resulted in a child who has regular seizures not having access to emergency seizure medication when on an outing.

Staff have not referred unexplained marks and bruises to appropriate professionals in line with the home's safeguarding procedures. As a result, opportunities to investigate potential safeguarding concerns have been missed.

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Children's behaviour has not always been managed appropriately by staff. Children who have complex disabilities, and who are very vulnerable, have not always been treated with kindness and respect. In addition, poor decision-making by staff when managing the behaviour of children has resulted in children being placed at risk of harm.

Recent safeguarding incidents have not been referred to Ofsted as they should have been. This has limited the ability of Ofsted to carry out its regulatory functions.

Senior managers within the organisation have identified the shortfalls themselves during a detailed audit of the home's operation. Once the shortfalls were known to them, they made sure that safeguarding procedures were followed. They have implemented an urgent improvement plan. Although examples of poor practice are still apparent, managers are now recognising and responding to these issues.

Senior managers have put together a new management team in the home. They have also reduced the number of children living in the home from eight to four. These actions address immediate safety concerns.

Leaders are making appropriate decisions. Some members of staff whose practice is under review are no longer working directly with children. Others are working under the close supervision of the new management team. Staffing shortages are further exacerbated by the fact that several staff are self-isolating in accordance with COVID-19 (coronavirus) guidelines. The staffing situation is unstable. This impacts of the consistency of care provided to children.

Some agency staff have not received enough induction or specific training to provide high-quality care to children with such complex needs.

Requirements made at the assurance visit on 30 September have not been fully assessed during this visit. These are carried forward to be reviewed at the next visit.

This relates to agency staff who have not received sufficient induction or training.

that staff—	
assess whether each child is at risk of harm, taking into account information in the child's relevant plans, and, if necessary, make arrangements to reduce the risk of any harm to the child;	
help each child to understand how to keep safe;	
have the skills to identify and act upon signs that a child is at risk of harm;	
understand the roles and responsibilities in relation to protecting children that are assigned to them by the registered person;	
take effective action whenever there is a serious concern about a child's welfare. (Regulation 12 (1) (2)(a)(i)(ii)(iii)(v)(vi))	
This relates to the appropriate escalation of concerns about children's welfare when they are identified.	



The registered person must make arrangements for the handling, recording, safekeeping, safe administration and disposal of medicines received into the children's home.	1 December 2020
In particular the registered person must ensure that—	
medicine which is prescribed for a child is administered as prescribed to the child; and	
a record is kept of the administration of medicine to each child. (Regulation 23 (1) (2)(b)(c))	
This relates to recent medication errors and the need to make sure that children have access to any rescue medicines that they might require.	
The registered person must notify HMCI and each other relevant person without delay if—	1 December 2020
a child is involved in or subject to, or is suspected of being involved in or subject to, sexual exploitation;	
an incident requiring police involvement occurs in relation to a child which the registered person considers to be serious;	
there is an allegation of abuse against the home or a person working there;	
a child protection enquiry involving a child—	
is instigated; or	
concludes (in which case, the notification must include the outcome of the child protection enquiry); or	
there is any other incident relating to a child which the registered person considers to be serious. (Regulation 40 (4)(a)(b)(c)(d)(i)(ii)(e))	
This relates to recent events concerning children's safety which Ofsted has not been made aware of.
