Information about this children's home

This children's home is owned and managed by a private organisation. It is registered for up to three children who have had adverse childhood experiences that have led to associated trauma and complex behaviours.

There is a new manager in post who is in the process of registering with Ofsted.

This monitoring visit

This is the second monitoring visit to monitor compliance with the notice to suspend the home's registration, and to review the action taken following the previous monitoring visit, on 17 November 2020. This monitoring visit included several telephone discussions, a review of records and a virtual visit to the home.

Since the last visit, one of the directors has become the responsible individual and a new manager has started working at the home. Staff shared during this monitoring visit that the new manager is approachable and knowledgeable. They said that they feel confident in the positive improvements senior leaders have made and are keen to start caring for children again.

The new manager, in partnership with the directors, has completed a detailed and meaningful action plan to address the previous requirements made. These requirements will be monitored at the next inspection, as no children have been living at this home to enable monitoring of whether the actions have been effective or not.

Leaders and managers have implemented a thorough training programme to ensure staff have the confidence and skills in readiness to care for children. A psychologist has contributed to the programme and has provided some training to

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staff. A new head of operations has also been appointed to improve managerial oversight and practice within the home.

The registration of this home is no longer suspended as leaders and managers have taken sufficient action to address the previous concerns, to ensure children are safeguarded. A staff training programme is under way and will be completed prior to any children moving into the home.

manage relationships between children to prevent them from harming each other; understand the roles and responsibilities in relation to protecting children that are assigned to them by the registered person: take effective action whenever there is a serious concern about a child's welfare; and are familiar with, and act in accordance with, the home's child protection policies; that the home's day-to-day care is arranged and delivered so as to keep each child safe and to protect each child effectively from harm; that the premises used for the purposes of the home are designed, furnished and maintained so as to protect each child from avoidable hazards to the child's health; and that the effectiveness of the home's child protection policies is monitored regularly. ensure that the home's workforce provides continuity of care to each child: understand the impact that the quality of care provided in the home is having on the progress and experiences of each child and use this understanding to inform the development of the quality of care provided in the home; demonstrate that practice in the home is informed and improved by taking into account and acting on research and developments in relation to the ways in which the needs of children are best met; and feedback on the experiences of children, including complaints received; and use monitoring and review systems to make continuous improvements in the quality of care provided in the home. (Regulation 13 (1)(a)(b)(c) (2)(a)(b)(c)(e)(f)(g)(i)(ii)(h)) The care planning standard is that children— 31 March 2021 receive effectively planned care in or through the children's home; and have a positive experience of arriving at or moving on from the home. In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure that arrangements are in place to manage and review the placement of each child in the home; and plan for, and help, each child to prepare to leave the home or to move into adult care in a way that is consistent with arrangements agreed with the child's placing authority; that the child's placing authority is contacted, and a review of that child's relevant plans is requested, if the registered person considers that the child is at risk of harm or has concerns that the care provided for the child is inadequate to meet the child's needs.
