### Information about this children's home

This children's home is operated by a private provider. It is registered for up to four young people who may have emotional, behavioural and/or learning difficulties.

The manager has been registered with Ofsted since December 2020.

## This monitoring visit

This monitoring visit was completed off site. The visit was instigated due to a regulation 40 notification received by the regulator. The safeguarding notification related to a serious incident of self-harm. Information provided to the regulator also raised concerns about the management of this incident and of the actions taken by staff following the event. Recommendations from the previous inspection were not examined during this visit.

In relation to the incident which triggered this visit, staff were found to have responded quickly and effectively. This ensured the young person's safety. However, staff do not have clear guidance or procedures for dealing with instances of suicidal ideation, suicide attempts or self-harm that are individualised to young people. Staff were inconsistent in their responses when asked about procedures for managing similar unforeseen events. This compromises staff's abilities to respond appropriately to incidents.

The team have not received up-to-date training appropriate to young people's self-harming behaviours. This means that their capacity to respond to and manage such incidents is not informed by recent research and guidance. Because of this, staff do not have the correct skills to ensure young people's safety during times of crisis.

Risk assessments are updated following any serious or significant events. Risk levels are appropriate and take historical and current information into consideration. Young

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people are aware of their risks and feel supported by those in the home to reduce them.

Following incidents, staff monitor young people and support them to discuss their concerns or worries. On one occasion, a young person refused to attend health services. Staff did not seek advice and guidance from qualified professionals, for example by using the NHS 111 service. This means that there has been a delay in young people receiving assessments for both their physical and mental health.

Care planning for young people is not robust. The home incorporates plans for health and education into one singular care plan. This plan does not include all the necessary information from which to form the basis of young people's care. For example, young people's mental needs are not clearly documented. Consequently, those working with young people do not have all the necessary information to provide agreed, individualised needs-assessed care.

Young people have positive experiences of moving in to the home. Leaders and managers take the time to get to know and understand young people prior to their admission. Robust transition planning ensures that staff are able to provide a safe and supportive environment that meets young people's needs.

Young people benefit from the consistency of having a dedicated and experienced staff team that recognises the need for stability and positive relationships. Team meeting minutes include clear key-working responsibilities and evidence a child-centred approach to care. Because of this, young people have positive relationships with staff and are able to discuss their problems or worries.
