Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This children's home is run by a registered charity. The home is registered to provide care and accommodation for 11 children who may have learning disabilities and/or a physical disability. The service is provided in two separate houses. One house provides care and accommodation for up to four children under short-break arrangements and up to two children to live permanently. The other house provides care and accommodation for up to five children to live permanently.

The home's registration is currently subject to a notice of restriction of accommodation. This means that no new admissions and no short breaks are permitted. The children who lived at the home at the time of the notice may continue to live there.

The home has been without a registered manager since January 2020.

This monitoring visit

The main purpose of this monitoring visit was to check the home's compliance with the notice restricting accommodation.

This enforcement notice was issued on 26 November 2020 under section 22B of the Care Standards Act. The notice followed the monitoring visit that was completed on 20 November 2020. During that visit, significant shortfalls were identified and 12 requirements were raised.

The notice restricting accommodation is in force until 18 February 2021. Meanwhile, the home and the notice are subject to Ofsted monitoring and review.

The main outcome of this monitoring visit is that the provider is complying with the enforcement notice. One child who lived at this home at the time of the notice being

issued has left and three have continued to live there. No other children have been admitted. The provider stopped offering short breaks on the day of the notice.

The underlying purpose of the notice is to give the provider the opportunity to focus the home's resources on improving the service for the three children who live at this home.

The provider has acknowledged shortfalls and developed improvement plans. These plans are being implemented but there has been limited or no progress in many areas. Improvements are not sufficently monitored to ensure changes are being sustained.

Independent scrutiny and assurance through external monitoring visits has been hampered by a lack of access to any records held electronically. There have been gaps in staff receiving supervision. A report into allegations concerning a member of staff highlights long-standing difficulties with staff communications and professional boundaries.

The leaders and managers recognise the scale of improvement required due to a legacy of inconsistent management and high levels of incidents. In this context the provider has made the decision to close both the residential house and the short-breaks service. As a result, the acting manager is in the process of cancelling their application to register. The placing local authority for the three children and the local designated officer are reported to have supported the decision to close the provision.

The provider is committed to implementing the improvement plan up until closure has been completed and is committed to ensuring a successful transition for all three children. However, incidents of poor practice are still happening, such as insecure disposal of medication. Any delays in children being able to transition from the home could mean the current care arrangements will continue; this is a concern if the identified improvements are not made rapidly.

All 12 requirements that were raised at the previous monitoring visit are restated in this monitoring report.

What does the children's home need to do to improve?

Statutory requirements

ensure that staff understand and apply the home's statement of purpose; protect and promote each child's welfare; treat each child with dignity and respect; provide personalised care that meets each child's needs, as recorded in the child's relevant plans, taking account of the child's background. any actions that the registered person considers necessary in order to improve or maintain the quality of care provided for children.	
After completing a quality of care review, the registered person must produce a written report about the quality of care review and the actions which the registered person intends to take as a result of the quality of care review ("the quality of care review report").	
The registered person must—	
supply to HMCI a copy of the quality of care review report within 28 days of the date on which the quality of care review is completed; and	
make a copy of the quality of care review report available on request to a placing authority, if the placing authority is not the parent of a child accommodated in the home.	
The system referred to in paragraph (2) must provide for ascertaining and considering the opinions of children, their parents, placing authorities and staff.
