Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This home is one of a number of homes that are operated by a large, private organisation. The home is registered to provide care and accommodation for up to two young people who may have emotional and/or behavioural difficulties.

A manager was appointed in December 2020, but has not yet applied to register with Ofsted.

We last visited this children's home on 3 March 2020, when we carried out a full inspection.

This monitoring visit

This monitoring visit was carried out in line with Ofsted's procedures for monitoring services during the current period of suspended routine inspection activity.

The visit was carried out using a combination of on-site and off-site activity.

Young people are making good progress in all areas. They are attending education provisions and taking part in positive activities with staff and each other. There has been a significant decrease in the young people's high-risk behaviours, such as going missing from home, which means that they are safer on a day-to-day basis.

Young people described positive relationships with staff and said that they can talk to staff if anything is troubling them. Young people expressed confidence in the staff and one young person said of the manager, 'He speaks up for us. You always feel like he has got your back.'

Staff have a good understanding of the young people's needs and the things that are important to them. Care planning is of generally good quality and includes guidance

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for staff on the young people's daily needs. It would be useful to implement additional guidance for staff when a young person's needs change temporarily, for example due to illness or short-term medical treatment.

Assessments demonstrate that risks to young people are decreasing over time. For example, one young person was admitted with a history of frequently going missing and engaging in offending behaviour. Since his admission to the home, he has not presented with any concerning behaviours.

Staff are able to de-escalate challenging situations quickly and effectively. This is reflected in the fact that there have been no instances where staff have been required to physically intervene or restrain a young person.

Prior to the admission of one young person, an impact risk assessment was completed. This assessment lacked some significant information and did not demonstrate that the whole range of information had been properly considered. Failure to record the relevant information could lead to shortfalls in risk-management practice.

An incident occurred in the home in December 2020 which raised some safeguarding concerns. Although the manager took appropriate action to immediately safeguard the young people, the matter was not reported to all relevant agencies within the correct timescales, as set out in the organisation's safeguarding procedures.

Concerns had previously been identified in relation to the personal situation of the same staff member. These concerns were not well managed and the measures that were agreed, including increased supervision, were not followed through by the previous manager. These shortfalls mean that there has been a failure to manage risks and ensure that young people are being cared for by staff who are mentally and physically fit to carry out their role.

The home is currently without a registered manager. A manager has been appointed and is in the process of submitting an application for registration with Ofsted. Handover arrangements between the outgoing manager and the current manager were not effective. Significant information was not passed on to the new manager, regarding the concerns above which meant that he was not aware of an ongoing risk-management plan. Therefore, some significant risks were not mitigated.

There is a stable staff team in place. The staff are well motivated and spoke positively about the support provided for young people. Staff expressed confidence in the new manager and reported good levels of support. Currently, the staff team is wholly male and consequently the young people do not have the opportunity to have regular contact with different gender groups. The manager has recognised this is an area for development and is currently attempting to address the matter.



An independent person carries out a monthly visit to the home to assess standards. These visits have taken place consistently throughout periods of government restrictions due to the COVID-19 pandemic. However, reports of the visits have not always been sent to Ofsted within the expected timescales. This undermines Ofsted's ability to monitor services effectively, and therefore compromises the young people's safety and well-being.

What does the children's home need to do to improve?

Statutory requirements

Recommendations

- The registered person should ensure that direct work undertaken with young people reflects that young people have been encouraged to express their views, wishes and feelings and that these have been taken into account when planning and undertaking young people's care. ('Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards', page 21, paragraph 4.5)
- The registered person should ensure that there is clear guidance in place for staff on short-term changes to young people's needs as a result of illness, injury or medical treatment. ('Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards', page 33, paragraph 7.3)
- The registered person should ensure that young people are supported by staff from different gender groups, so that young people are enabled to develop relationships with a diverse range of adults. ('Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards', page 54, paragraph 10.22)
