Information about this children's home

This home is part of a charitable organisation. The home is registered to provide short breaks for up to six children who may have emotional and/or behavioural difficulties and/or physical disabilities and/or learning disabilities.

There is currently no registered manager in post.

This monitoring visit

This on-site visit was carried out in response to concerns about staffing levels, staff competency and staff supervision. In addition, matters arising from the Ofsted survey, safeguarding notifications and monthly monitoring reports have been considered. The home has not been inspected since September 2019.

The manager, who was appointed in November 2020, has recently left the organisation. Suitable arrangements are in place for the management of the home until a permanent manager is identified.

Three recommendations were made at the last inspection. Suitable action has been taken to ensure that staff understand and implement agreed risk management strategies. Some progress has been made in improving restraint records, which now include the manager's evaluation. However, these records continue to be kept in a bound book with no copy of the record being placed on the child's file. A recommendation relating to the use of restorative justice was not considered during this visit.

The number of children who access this service has been significantly reduced since the start of the COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic. As a result, several staff have been redeployed to elsewhere in the organisation, leaving a core team of staff to support up to three children at a time. The team is supplemented by a small number

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of flexible support workers and staff from the organisation's school. These staff work regularly with the children to provide continuity of care. When asked about staffing, a social worker said:

It is usually the same staff caring for [name of child]. [Name of child] needs familiarity, and without it his behaviour deteriorates. The fact that he has only had one restraint since being at this service tells me that they understand him and know how he ticks. [Name of child] was having two restraints a day at his previous placement and was on the verge of going into full-time care. He is like a different person now.

The arrangements for supervising staff require improvement. Consistency has been undermined by the movement of staff, which has resulted in several staff going for long periods of time without formal supervision. Given the pressures of the role, which are currently being amplified as a result of the pandemic, this is an area that needs to be addressed quickly.

Staff understand children's needs, risks and vulnerabilities, including behaviours that are complex and challenging. Acquiring quality training has been a challenge during the pandemic. This has resulted in a delay in staff completing some needs-led training. However, as circumstances change, so do the training opportunities for staff. For example, several staff have recently completed training to provide a safer environment for children who exhibit symptoms of pica, which is being rolled out across the organisation.

There has been one allegation made since Ofsted last visited the home. Suitable action was taken, including referral to the designated officer. However, in-house records were incomplete and did not provide evidence of the decisions made by external safeguarding professionals or the outcome of the incident. This information was acquired later during the visit from elsewhere in the organisation.

Statutory requirements
