### Information about this children's home

The home is operated by a local authority and provides care for up to four children. The home provides multi-systemic therapy using the Family Integrated Transitions Model. Placements are for up to 12 weeks. The staff deliver an intensive dialectical behaviour therapy programme. The manager registered in October 2018.

## This monitoring visit

Due to the restrictions in place relating to the COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic, this visit was carried out off site. The purpose of the visit was to explore potential breaches of regulations, following information being shared with Ofsted in notifications that indicated a potential risk of harm to the children. The visit included a review of documents, discussions with the manager, staff members and social workers.

The home has not had a full inspection since April 2019.

Staff support children to learn how to regulate their emotions better and use coping strategies that reduce the risk of harm. Children develop skills such as communicating with others and self-awareness. Staff help children to use their newfound skills, which enables them to reintegrate back into a family home.

Children have a say and are actively involved to make decisions about their lives. For example, when one child's care plan changed, staff sensitively helped the child to understand the reasons for the change and explored what support she needed for a future move. The social work team manager said, 'Staff are taking a leading role in supporting the child's transition.' The support and guidance from staff helped to better prepare the child for her move to a new home.

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The manager was quick to gather information and put a plan in place to help settle a child who arrived at the home at short notice. This was helpful as children do not normally arrive at the home in an unplanned way. A safety plan was quickly implemented, which provided the team with the strategies needed to reduce the risk of harm. The social work team manager said, 'Lots of planning has occurred, the child has been stabilised, and he felt listened to.'

The individualised risk assessments set out the care and support provided to the children. These records provide staff with a clear overview of the children's needs and the strategies needed to reduce the risk of harm.

Staff feel supported and are aware of their roles and responsibilities. The manager provides good oversight of the day-to-day care and is a visible leader in the home. Staff also have regular supervision and training, which provides them with the skills and knowledge needed to care effectively for the children at the home.

Planning for children who are referred to the home is well thought out. However, impact risk assessments lack managerial evaluation and do not describe the actions needed to enable the children to live together. This could potentially result in staff not having the required strategies in place to keep children safe when they first arrive at the home.

The requirements from the last inspection have been met.
