

# 1256135 Homes 2 Inspire Limited

Monitoring visit Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

## Information about this children's home

This privately-owned children's home is operated by a large national provider. It is registered to care for up to three children who have complex needs and have experienced trauma and loss.

The new manager starts in post on the 1 April 2021 and is in the process of registering with Ofsted.

## This monitoring visit

Ofsted inspected the home on 13 and 14 October 2020. Serious and widespread concerns were identified. As a result, Ofsted took the decision to issue the home with a notice to vary a condition of the registration. Ofsted considered this to be the most appropriate action and believed that reducing numbers from five children to three, on an urgent basis for up to 12 weeks, would give managers and staff the opportunity to reduce the risk of harm that was present in the home. Additionally, Ofsted issued a compliance notice under regulation 13 (the leadership and management standard).

A monitoring visit was carried out on 3 November 2020 to review the notice to vary a condition of the registration. At the monitoring visit, inspectors found that despite the number of children being reduced to three, children were not safe in the home. As a result of the significant concerns identified, Ofsted made the decision to issue a notice to suspend the registration of this home. This took immediate effect from 4 November 2020 until 26 January 2021.

A further monitoring visit took place on 16 December 2020 to review the suspension notice. The inspector found that the provider had complied with the suspension notice and the home was being refurbished. The registered manager and the



responsible individual had left the organisation.

On 19 January 2021, a further monitoring visit took place. The visit found that the provider had continued to comply with the suspension notice. The provider decided not to admit children until the senior managers' action plan was implemented.

At this latest monitoring visit, inspectors found that a new manager and a new responsible individual have been appointed. The staff team has benefited from learning and development opportunities over recent months. This training has helped the staff to improve their knowledge and skills in readiness for the home to reopen. In addition, the home has benefited from refurbishment. Consequently, the home is now ready to start to readmit children.

The requirements raised at the previous inspections have not been reviewed and, therefore, remain in place.
