Information about this children's home

This home is owned and managed by a private provider. It is registered to provide care and accommodation for up to five children who may have emotional and/or social difficulties and/or learning disabilities.

The home registered in February 2017. There is currently no registered manager in post.

Inspection date: 6 April 2021

This monitoring visit

Due to the restrictions in place relating to COVID-19 (coronavirus), this visit was carried out off site. The purpose of the visit was to monitor the provider's compliance with enforcement action. The visit included review of documents, a virtual tour of the home and discussions with staff.

This home was last visited on 24 February 2021 when a monitoring visit took place. Following this visit, a restriction of accommodation was issued to prevent any other children being admitted into the home. Three compliance notices were served under regulations 6, 12 and 13 to address serious concerns. These relate to children being provided with poor and unsafe living conditions, poor risk management and widespread failings with the leadership and management of the home. A further three requirements were issued to address other shortfalls.

The responsible individual, who took up her position in January 2021, had recognised some of the shortfalls found during the previous visit and served notice on all of the children placed in the home. There are currently no children living in the home.

The responsible individual has devised and implemented an action plan to address the condition of the home. Repairs and maintenance work have started, and the home is in various stages of refurbishment. There is a considerable amount of work

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still required. Therefore, the home is not in a suitable condition to accommodate children.

Not all staff are aware of a monthly environmental audit to check the home for general maintenance issues. Additionally, no other routine checks take place to check for damage and repair work needed on a more regular basis. This means that there are insufficient systems in place to ensure that issues in the home are identified and reported. This could potentially expose children to a serious risk of harm.

Most of the care staff are currently furloughed. Those who remain have completed training exercises in risk assessment and care planning processes. These staff demonstrate knowledge and understanding of how to develop and maintain current records. This means that staff are developing the skills required to enable them to provide children with consistent care.

There are managerial auditing processes in place to monitor and review children's records. This means that there are systems to scrutinise the care that children receive.

There are shortfalls in some areas of training. A considerable proportion of staff are not enrolled on a suitable level 3 childcare course. Additionally, there are gaps in mandatory training, including health and safety, first aid and fire safety. The responsible individual has recognised these shortfalls and booked some training. However, staff are not currently sufficiently trained and/or enrolled on a suitable course to enable them to care for children effectively and safely.

Staff benefit from regular supervision and team meetings. These are used to share information, discuss concerns, embed strategies and drive improvement forward. However, there is no system to appraise staff. This means that staff do not have this opportunity to reflect on their practice to ensure that it is safe to meet the needs of children in their care.

Recruitment files have been audited and the shortfalls raised have been suitably actioned. Safer recruitment processes have been implemented. This means that there are assurances that adults are suitably vetted to work with children.

The responsible individual is overseeing the day-to-day running and management of the home. The posts of registered manager and deputy manager are currently vacant. This means that there is not a sufficient team of leaders to accommodate children safely and effectively should they be admitted to the home.

Following this visit, the restriction of accommodation order will remain in place. The compliance notices previously issued under regulations 12 and 13 are not fully met. These notices are reissued. Two additional requirements are issued under regulations 6 and 27. The previously issued requirements under regulations 5, 8 and 45 were not reviewed during this visit. For this reason, they are reissued.
