Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

#### Information about this children's home

This home is one of a number of homes operated by a private organisation. The home provides care and accommodation for up to 10 children who may have a disability or behavioural needs. Accommodation is provided across five units. However, at the time of this inspection, only one unit was in operation.

The home has been without a registered manager since August 2020. Ofsted has not yet received a suitable manager's application.

We last visited this home on 18 March 2021, when we carried out a monitoring visit.

### This monitoring visit

This visit was carried out to assess action taken to meet the requirements of a compliance notice issued to the home on 25 March 2021, in relation to leadership and management.

Three children were living at the home at the time of the visit. They continue to make good progress in a number of areas. Children are growing in confidence, developing positive relationships with staff and attending education regularly.

There has been a reduction of significant incidents, although these do continue to occur. The recording of incidents, such as physical restraints, has improved. In addition, managers are monitoring incidents more effectively and carrying out meaningful reflection with both children and staff.

The provider has reviewed processes for assessing safety and quality, and arranged for additional monitoring to be carried out. This has included unannounced, out-of-hours visits and some detailed audits. This helps to ensure that areas requiring improvement are identified and can therefore be addressed. Additional monitoring also assists managers to identify poor or unsafe practice.

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Staff have been provided with training in a number of areas since the last inspection. These include areas such as trauma informed care and therapeutic intervention. It is intended that the additional training will assist staff to develop their understanding of children's behaviours and how to respond to these in a helpful way. A staff member spoke positively about the training, commenting that it had helped to enhance her practice.

There has been no registered manager in this home since September 2020. This does not support consistent leadership or the safe, effective management of the service. Furthermore, the failure to propose a registered manager means that Ofsted is unable to ascertain the fitness and suitability of the person in charge of the day-to-day running of the home. This does not promote young people's safety, well-being or good progress. Ofsted is taking further compliance action in relation to this matter.

meet each child's behavioural and emotional needs, as set out in the child's relevant plans;	



help each child to develop socially aware behaviour;	
communicate to each child expectations about the child's behaviour and ensure that the child understands those expectations in accordance with the child's age and understanding;	
understand how children's previous experiences and present emotions can be communicated through behaviour and have the competence and skills to interpret these and develop positive relationships with children. (Regulation $11(1)$ (a)(b)(c)(2)(a)(i)(ii)(v)(ix))	
This relates to the need to take into account children's level of understanding when sharing expectations about their behaviours. This also relates to the need to ensure that staff have appropriate skills and knowledge about children's behaviours and why they may occur.

take effective action whenever there is a serious concern about a child's welfare; and

No measure of control or discipline which is excessive, unreasonable or contrary to paragraph (2) may be used in relation to any child.	07 May 2021
The following measures may not be used to discipline any child—	
any restriction, other than one imposed by a court or in accordance with regulation 22 (contact and access to communications), on—	
a child's contact with parents, relatives or friends. (Regulation 19 (1)(2)(c)(i))	



Restraint in relation to a child is only permitted for the purpose of preventing—	07 May 2021

serious damage to the property of any person (including the child); or	
Restraint in relation to a child must be necessary and proportionate. (Regulation 20 (1)(a)(b)(2))	
The registered person must make arrangements for the handling, recording, safekeeping, safe administration and disposal of medicines received into the children's home. (Regulation 23(1))	07 May 2021
