#### **Inspection judgements**

### Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: requires improvement to be good

In order to meet the additional staffing requirements of children, staff from other homes within the organisation have been deployed to this home. Although the core staff team has a clear understanding of children's needs and behaviour management strategies, deployed staff have not fully understood children's needs. At times, they have not been able to provide appropriate support when children's anxieties and behaviours have escalated.

When writing records, staff sometimes use language that could stigmatise children. This is particularly when recording children's behaviours.

Healthcare plans are comprehensive. Staff ensure that children are able to access therapeutic support for their mental and emotional health needs. Staff are good at supporting children who are anxious about attending health appointments.

Staff support children to maintain good physical and emotional health. A healthy and well-balanced menu is on offer and the children are supported to have active lifestyles, including going to the gym, swimming, bike riding and walking.

All children are receiving some form of education. Their educational progress is variable, but this is due to their personal challenges, rather than a lack of support from staff and managers. The manager has advocated strongly on behalf of the children. She has ensured that they have access to education that is tailored to their needs and interests.

When children leave the home, staff and managers ensure positive endings. Children leave with beautiful memory books, capturing their achievements at the home. This enables the children to reflect positively on their time at the home in later life.

### How well children and young people are helped and protected: requires improvement to be good

Children's risk assessments do not provide staff with clear guidance to enable them to keep children safe. For example, staff are not clear about safety arrangements when children are cycling or travelling in the car. This has the potential to place children at risk.

Staff's approach to behaviour management is not consistent. There have been occasions when staff have not taken every opportunity to de-escalate challenging behaviour before resorting to physical intervention.

Records of restraint are sometimes poor because they do not include all required information. Also, after being restrained, children have not always been given the



opportunity to talk about the restraint. Consequently, managers are less able to gain an insight into why restraint was used, and to monitor the performance of staff.

Staff carefully follow missing-from-care protocols. They work effectively alongside safeguarding agencies to locate children quickly. When children have been missing, staff have maintained contact with them and ensured that they are offered independent return interviews so that risks and vulnerabilities are explored.

### The effectiveness of leaders and managers: requires improvement to be good

The manager has been registered since December 2020. In this short time, she has worked hard to improve the home and has made some positive changes. The manager has prioritised direct work with children and staff. She provides staff with high-quality support. However, some management monitoring systems are not yet effective.

Staff who are deployed from other homes have not been supported to fully understand the needs of the children they are caring for. As a result, children's behaviour is not consistently well managed.

The manager has completed a thorough analysis of the strengths and areas for improvement for each staff member. This has enabled her to develop individual training programmes. However, there are still some gaps in staff training.

The core staff group receive regular supervision which supports them to improve their practice and develop within their role.



## What does the children's home need to do to improve? Statutory requirements

that the home's day-to-day care is arranged and delivered so as to keep each child safe and to protect each child effectively from harm.  (Regulation 12 (1) (2)(a)(v)(b))	
This specifically relates to improving the accuracy of risk assessment and restraint practice.	
The leadership and management standard is that the registered person enables, inspires and leads a culture in relation to the children's home that—	24 May 2021
helps children aspire to fulfil their potential; and promotes their welfare.	

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In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to—

use monitoring and review systems to make continuous improvements in the quality of care provided in the home.

(Regulation 13 (1)(a)(b) (2)(h))

This specifically relates to management monitoring systems.

The registered person must ensure that—

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within 24 hours of the use of a measure of control, discipline or restraint in relation to a child in the home, a record is made which includes—

the name of the child;

details of the child's behaviour leading to the use of the measure;

the date, time and location of the use of the measure;

a description of the measure and its duration;

details of any methods used or steps taken to avoid the need to use the measure:

the name of the person who used the measure ("the user"), and of any other person present when the measure was used;

the effectiveness and any consequences of the use of the measure; and

a description of any injury to the child or any other person, and any medical treatment administered, as a result of the measure;

within 5 days of the use of the measure, the registered person or the authorised person adds to the record confirmation that they have spoken to the child about the measure.

(Regulation 35 (3)(a)(i)(ii)(iii)(iv)(v)(vi)(vii)(viii) (c))

#### Recommendations



- The registered person should ensure that when restraint involves the use of force, the force used must not be more than is necessary and should be applied in a way that is proportionate, i.e. the minimum amount of force necessary to avert injury or serious damage to property, for the shortest possible time. ('Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards', page 48, paragraph 9.50)
- The registered person should ensure that staff are familiar with the home's policies on record-keeping and understand the importance of careful, objective and clear recording. Staff should record information on individual children in a non-stigmatising way that distinguishes between fact, opinion and third-party information. Information about the child must always be recorded in a way that will be helpful to the child.
