Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

A private company owns and manages this home. The home provides a tailored care programme, for approximately a year, for up to four young females aged between 11 and 18 years who have experienced, or who are at risk of, sexual exploitation.

It is likely that these children will also have emotional, social and/or behavioural difficulties as a result of their experiences. The manager has been registered with Ofsted since June 2020.

Due to COVID-19 (coronavirus), at the request of the Secretary of State, we suspended all routine inspections of social care providers on 17 March 2020.

We last visited this setting on 6 and 7 May 2021 to carry out a full inspection. The report is published on our website.

This monitoring visit

This children's home was judged inadequate at the full inspection on 6 and 7 May 2021, because children living in the home were at risk of serious harm. Leaders and managers, including the registered manager and responsible individual, failed to address safeguarding concerns. As a result of this failure, children's safety was compromised. Ofsted suspended the registration of this home on 7 May 2021 and issued three compliance notices under regulations 12, 13 and 32. Ofsted also raised a further six requirements. These have not been assessed as part of this monitoring visit.

The purpose of this monitoring visit was to review the progress and actions taken to meet the compliance notices. This monitoring visit included the review of documents and discussions with the registered manager, the responsible individual and the quality improvement manager.

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The registered manager is working in line with the suspension notice. Children moved out of the home on 7 May 2021, and there are no children living in the home. Currently, there are no staff based at the home.

The inspector concluded from this monitoring visit that one step set in the compliance notice with regard to regulation 13 was not met. As a result, the suspension notice remains in place.

Currently, there are an insufficient number of staff in post to support children if the suspension notice was lifted. The registered provider is taking steps to recruit to the vacant posts. Most of the current cohort of appointed staff are waiting to complete an induction into their role. The induction programme is designed to develop the staff's understanding and knowledge of their roles and responsibilities. There is currently only one member of staff who has developed the foundations of practice knowledge through relevant training and reflection.

The responsible individual and registered manager have completed safer recruitment training, and the required safer recruitment procedures are now in use. The registered manager has improved her understanding of safer recruitment. For example, the verification of previous employment records now consistently forms part of the recruitment process. These steps help to ensure that children are cared for by staff who are deemed safe to work with them.

Protocols with regard to the admission of children to the home have been strengthened. The registered manager is now clear at the start of the referral process about expectations, for example, initial restrictions to family time, internet and phone use and children smoking. These boundaries have previously been blurred. This was detrimental to the children and to their progress.

Additional safeguarding and risk assessment training mean that the staff are now able to recognise the importance of effective and individualised risk assessments for each child. Furthermore, the registered manager has re-organised the children's incident records. This improved structure will help the registered manager's oversight and reflection of the quality of care for children and ensure that strategies and plans are developed to support them.

Children had previously expressed their anxieties and frustrations by causing damage to the home. The condition of the home has been improved, and there is evidence of maintenance and redecoration. The registered manager has developed procedures to ensure that the home environment is routinely checked for potential hazards, such as the safe disposal of used razors. A new lockable cabinet now means that cleaning materials are securely locked away.

The registered manager needs the knowledge and skills to be able to fulfil her role. A personal development plan has been created to assist her professional development. Quality assurance is now a focus for this home. This is to ensure that



practice is delivered to a good standard and any shortfalls are immediately addressed.
