Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

### Information about this children's home

This children's home is run by a registered charity. It provides care for up to seven disabled children.

The manager has been registered with Ofsted since March 2021.

**Inspection date:** 6 July 2021

## This monitoring visit

This home was judged inadequate at the full inspection on 18 and 19 May 2021. During the inspection, inspectors found evidence of breaches of regulations relating to safeguarding, care planning and the leadership of the home. Three compliance notices were issued in relation to Regulation 12 (the protection of children standard), Regulation 13 (the leadership and management standard) and Regulation 14 (the care planning standard).

Ofsted carried out a monitoring visit on 7 July 2021 to consider the action the provider had taken to meet the steps in two of the compliance notices, those issued in relation to Regulation 12 and Regulation 13. There were five children living at the home at the time of the visit.

The registered provider has made significant improvements to the internal decoration of the home. For example, new furniture and accessories have been purchased for the lounge and dining room areas. These rooms are now more comfortable and homely. New cleaning routines are in place to support children to keep their bedrooms clean and tidy. However, some children's bedrooms require redecoration as there are areas where paint and wallpaper are peeling. Furthermore, the floor of the games room was very dirty on the day of the monitoring visit. A requirement has been made to address this.

The management team has reviewed the restrictions of liberty on children in the home to ensure they remain necessary and proportionate. Locks on exits to the back

garden have been removed and this gives children more choice and control about when they can use this space. In addition, all staff have received training in relation to mental capacity legislation. Staff were able to demonstrate how they apply this knowledge to their practice.

Staff have spent time with some children to help them understand how to stay safe when they are online. The manager has involved children in discussions about the checks that staff need to make to ensure children are safe when using the internet. However, while staff are regularly checking on the welfare of children, the records do not capture whether staff are checking what the child is accessing online or who they are speaking to. This fails to safeguard children.

Significant concerns remain in relation to the leadership and management of the home. The registered manager has been ineffective in prioritising and making improvements in the home.

The registered manager has failed to adequately identify and assess significant risks to the safety and well-being of children. For example, a child has been prescribed emergency medication for use in the event of an allergic reaction. The registered manager has failed to conduct a timely risk assessment of this child's health condition, and to provide staff with the guidance they require to respond safely and effectively to the child's health needs.

The registered manager has not ensured that all risk assessments are updated following significant events. For example, when one child was anxious, they placed a ligature loosely around their neck. With staff support and reassurance, the child removed this and was not harmed. However, this child's risk assessment was not updated with instructions for staff to follow should this behaviour happen again. This means that staff are not provided with the clear consistent instructions they need to safeguard children in their care.

The registered manager has failed to ensure that there are always sufficiently experienced staff in place to meet the needs of all the children who live at the home. For example, on one occasion, the emergency services advised that staff should administer emergency medication to a child. Staff were unable to action this as there were no staff on duty who had been trained to administer this medication. The child was taken to hospital for treatment. However, there were also insufficient numbers of staff on duty at the time, and this meant that staff could not go to hospital with the child.

The registered manager is not leading the home in a way that enables children to achieve their full potential. This is because she has not ensured that all staff balance the children's rights of choice and control over their lives with what is healthy and safe for children to do. For example, one child frequently stays up all night playing games on his computer and then he sleeps during the day. The manager has not ensured that staff work consistently and cohesively to positively challenge this behaviour and as a result, this child is making poor progress.



Staff demonstrate a lack of understanding of the home's safeguarding policies and their roles and responsibilities in relation to safeguarding children. In addition, staff were not able to demonstrate sufficient knowledge about some children's risk management plans and the actions they should take to protect children.

Internal and external monitoring systems are not sufficiently robust to identify the shortfalls in the quality of care provided to children. Furthermore, the quality of record keeping is variable. Several documents were not dated by the author of the entry and one record contained inappropriate language and doodles.

The registered provider and registered manager have not yet made sufficient progress to address all the steps detailed in the compliance notices. Therefore, compliance notices have been re-issued in relation to Regulation 12 and Regulation 13. The compliance notice issued under Regulation 14 and the additional requirements made at the full inspection were not considered during the monitoring visit so are repeated, for consideration at the next inspection.

Ofsted will continue to monitor the provider closely to ensure that improvements are made.

In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to lead and manage the home in a way that is consistent with the approach and ethos, and delivers the outcomes, set out in the home's statement of purpose; ensure that staff have the experience, qualifications and skills to meet the needs of each child; ensure that the home has sufficient staff to provide care for each child; understand the impact that the quality of care provided in the home is having on the progress and experiences of each child and use this understanding to inform the development of the quality of care provided in the home; use monitoring and review systems to make continuous improvements in the quality of care provided in the home.
