What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision requires improvement

Children are supervised well by the childminder, assistants and co-childminder who all work well together to provide a nurturing environment. Children confidently move around deciding what they would like to do, and the childminder supports their interests well. For example, children use wheeled toys indoors and others are busy using musical instruments and consider the sounds they make. The childminder is sensitive and children receive the individual attention they need to help promote their emotional well-being. For example, babies' routines are followed carefully and they are held and rocked to help soothe them when they are tired.

The children's interest in animals is used creatively to teach them about animals and their habitats through an engaging range of activities. This motivates children further to draw their own animals on a roll of paper on the floor. They confidently talk about their ideas and creations. The childminder skilfully extends their learning and children engage well as they think about the colours they use and where animals live. Children show a keen interest in stories and making marks. For example, they often choose to look at a book with an adult and enjoy making marks indoors and outdoors. Children behave well and happily play independently and in groups.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- It was found on the day of inspection that the childminder has car insurance which allows her to transport children to and from one school only. However, there have been several occasions when she has transported children to two separate schools. Although this does not impact on children's safety, the childminder does not meet the requirement of ensuring she has adequate car insurance to transport children. Therefore, leadership and management requires improvement to ensure all the statuary legal requirements are met at all times.
- The childminder combines children's individual interests, popular books and the changing seasons to offer experiences across the curriculum. She places a clear focus on promoting children's emotional well-being and communication and language skills. She uses the observation and assessment system in place effectively to help children make good progress from their starting points.
- There are effective systems in place to help parents share information about their children daily on arrival and collection. They are kept well informed about their children's time at the childminder's home. Parents receive detailed reports about how their children are progressing and suggestions on how they can support their learning at home. The childminder values parents' opinions, and their views from regular parent surveys are acted upon to develop the service.
- The childminder places a high priority on quickly identifying those children who need additional support. She works closely with parents and other professionals



to help them get the support they need to close gaps in children's learning. The childminder works with children, ensuring the environment and routine are adapted to meet any additional needs.

- The childminder, co-childminder and assistants work well to meet the varying development needs of children attending. The childminder has a good knowledge of the families and their individual home circumstances. However, she does not use this information well enough to help teach children about their similarities and differences and the wider community.
- The childminder works closely with parents to help them reinforce healthy eating messages and how to provide a balanced packed lunch for their children. Children take part in regular dance and movement sessions and enjoy using wheeled toys and balls. However, they have fewer opportunities to climb to help further challenge their physical development.
- There are high expectations of children's behaviour and they learn how to care for others. The childminder helps them develop a sense of right and wrong, and the older children show care and concern for babies.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

The childminder and all adults working with children have a good understanding of child protection issues and the procedures to follow if they have a concern about a child. There are effective systems in place to ensure the continued suitability of those working with household members and children. The assistants employed receive a detailed induction and benefit from supervision sessions to ensure they are clear about their safeguarding responsibilities. The childminder carries out daily checks to ensure her home is safe and suitable in preparation for children. Risk assessments are conducted for all outings, including school collections, and children are kept safe. For example, the childminder takes a first-aid box, children's personal details and a written list of children about road and car safety to keep them safe.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage, the provider must:

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the childminder and held discussions with the childminder, co-childminder and assistant.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of adults working with the childminder.
- The inspector took into account the views of parents.
