Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

The home is made up of separate houses in the grounds of a residential special school. Both the school and the home are owned and managed by a private company.

The children may be placed by various local authorities from across the United Kingdom. Their residential placements are for 38 or 52 weeks of the year. The school also caters for day pupils. The children may have learning disabilities and/or a diagnosis of autism spectrum disorder. They all have an education, health and care plan.

This monitoring visit

A monitoring visit took place on 29 March 2021, following concerns raised about the safety and protection of children and ineffective leadership and management. At that time, Ofsted issued compliance notices under regulation 12 (the protection of children standard) and regulation 13 (the leadership and management standard).

Ofsted carried out a further monitoring visit on 13 May 2021 to review the actions taken to address the steps detailed in the compliance notices. The inspectors found that leaders and managers had failed to take sufficient action to meet all aspects of these notices. Consequently, these notices were reissued.

At a monitoring visit on 22 June 2021, inspectors found that leaders and managers had again failed to complete all the necessary steps required to meet the compliance notices. The manager and head of care acknowledged that these had not been met and that they were still 'a work in progress'. As a result of that monitoring visit, Ofsted reissued two compliance notices under regulations 12 and 13 and suspended the registration of the home.

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Ofsted carried out a further monitoring visit on 3 August 2021. A tour of the site and discussions with the head of care confirmed that there were no children living in any of the houses that are linked to this registration. An action plan was in place to address the shortfalls found at the previous visits. Leaders and managers were monitoring the plan and some progress had been made. Ofsted reissued one compliance notice under regulation 13.

The purpose of this monitoring visit was to review the progress and the actions taken to meet the reissued compliance notice. This monitoring visit included the review of documents and discussions and interviews with the head of care and other relevant people. There are still no children living in any of the houses, although day pupils are attending the school. The inspector concluded from this monitoring visit that the final step set within the compliance notice was met.

The developed processes and guidance to provide better oversight of critical incidents have been shared with staff. Staff demonstrate an improved knowledge and understanding of this practice area. Managers and staff now know what is expected from them to maintain good and safe responses to children during, and following, any incidents. Staff said, 'Previously, I thought I knew my role and responsibilities but following all the training and guidance I now truly understand.'

A workforce development plan is in place and the staff team is completing a programme of training and developmental activities. Leaders and managers now have sufficient oversight of staff attendance at this training. Mop-up sessions and training course content are shared through a variety of processes. This helps all staff to have a consistent level of practice knowledge.

The development of managers' monitoring processes involves additional oversight and scrutiny from senior leaders. As a result of the suspension of the home, the managers have no records to audit. However, management meetings regularly look at and review these new processes and monitoring systems. The procedures that have been implemented mean that the children's risk assessments and the positive behaviour and risk intervention plans are routinely reviewed. Improvements to children's care experiences are expected, as tools are now in place to identify and address shortfalls in the quality of care for children.

Ofsted has received a complete application for the proposed registered manager. This manager has the necessary knowledge and experience for this role. An interview to assess their suitability for registration with Ofsted is scheduled.

The provider has met the actions detailed in the compliance notice. The suspension notice remains in place until 15 September 2021.

What does the children's home need to do to improve?

Statutory requirements

ensure that the premises used for the purposes of the home are designed and furnished so as to—	
meet the needs of each child; and

the health and well-being needs of children are met;	
children receive advice, services and support in relation to their health and well-being; and

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that each child is registered as a patient with a general medical practitioner and a registered dental practitioner; and	
that each child has access to such dental, medical, nursing, psychiatric and psychological advice, treatment and other services as the child may require. (Regulation 10 (1)(a)(b)(c) (2)(b)(c))

Restraint in relation to a child is only permitted for the purpose of preventing—	21 October 2021
injury to any person (including the child);	
serious damage to the property of any person (including the child); or	
a child who is accommodated in a secure children's home from absconding from the home.	
Restraint in relation to a child must be necessary and proportionate.	
These regulations do not prevent a child from being deprived of liberty where that deprivation is authorised in accordance with a court order. (Regulation 20 (1)(a)(b)(c) (2) (3))

The registered person must ensure that—	21 October 2021
within 24 hours of the use of a measure of control, discipline or restraint in relation to a child in the home, a record is made which includes—	
the name of the child;	
details of the child's behaviour leading to the use of the measure;	
the date, time and location of the use of the measure;	



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a description of the measure and its duration;	
details of any methods used or steps taken to avoid the need to use the measure;	
the name of the person who used the measure ('the user'), and of any other person present when the measure was used;	
the effectiveness and any consequences of the use of the measure; and	
a description of any injury to the child or any other person, and any medical treatment administered, as a result of the measure;	
within 48 hours of the use of the measure, the registered person, or a person who is authorised by the registered person to do so ('the authorised person')—	
has spoken to the user about the measure; and	
has signed the record to confirm it is accurate; and	
within 5 days of the use of the measure, the registered person or the authorised person adds to the record confirmation that they have spoken to the child about the measure. (Regulation 35 (3)(a)(i)(ii)(iii)(iv)(v)(vi)(vii)(viii)(b)(i)(ii)(c))

The registered person must notify HMCI and each other relevant person without delay if—	21 October 2021
there is any other incident relating to a child which the registered person considers to be serious. (Regulation 40 (4)(e))	
This is carried over from the monitoring visits. Evidence has been limited within this area because of the suspension of the home.	
When the independent person is carrying out a visit, the registered person must help the independent person—	21 October 2021



if they consent, to interview in private such of the children, their parents, relatives and persons working at the home as the independent person requires; and

to inspect the premises of the home and such of the home's records (except for a child's case records, unless the child and the child's placing authority consent) as the independent person requires.

The independent person must produce a report about a visit ('the independent person's report') which sets out, in particular, the independent person's opinion as to whether—

children are effectively safeguarded; and

the conduct of the home promotes children's well-being. (Regulation 44 (2)(a)(b) (4)(a)(b))
