Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- Children's safety is secure with the childminder. He knows how to complete risk assessments of his home and outdoor areas. He is able to identify the signs that may mean a child is at risk of abuse, and knows the referral procedures to follow. This includes the wider issues, such as the risks for children accessing inappropriate internet websites that may impact on their mental well-being. The childminder demonstrates his understanding of the procedures he must follow where there is a complaint or allegation against his practice.
- A suitable range of toys and resources are available to meet children's developing needs. The childminder understands how to use the early years foundation stage to support children's learning during play activities. He also explained how he will observe children's play and assess their progress before planning suitable activities to challenge their thinking and learning.
- Through discussion, the childminder demonstrates how he will develop a close working partnership with parents and other agencies. He intends to note what children can do when they begin at the setting, then provide ongoing assessments of their progress. The childminder will advise parents where there are any signs that a child may be falling behind, and access other agencies, where necessary, for additional guidance.
- The childminder understands the need to raise children's awareness of keeping fit and healthy. He explained the benefit of outdoor learning, and plans to use the nearby park for recreational activities to support children's physical skills and development. He has accessed training in food hygiene, and knows that a healthy diet, rest and exercise contribute to children's well-being.
- The childminder talks about how he will support children to be kind and caring to others. He has strategies to promote their positive behaviour.
- The childminder reviews his qualifications and updates his knowledge through additional training in safeguarding and the early learning goals. For example, he talks about providing children with appropriate challenges to support their communication and understanding of early mathematics.
- The childminder has renewed his qualification in paediatric first aid, and discusses procedures he would follow if a child had an accident. The childminder also has childcare insurance, and discusses other services available to protect him and the children in his care.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- This was the first routine inspection the childminder received since the COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic began. The inspector discussed the impact of the pandemic with the childminder and has taken this into account in the evaluation of the setting.
- The inspector and the childminder walked around the premises and discussed the areas used for childminding.
- The childminder showed the toys and resources he will use, and explained the curriculum plans.
- Relevant documentation was reviewed by the inspector, including qualifications and insurance cover.
- The inspector considered the childminder's plans for working in partnership with parents and other professionals.
- A discussion was held about times of availability as a childminder, as well as his role in managing a day nursery.



We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.
