Information about this children's home

This home is owned and managed by a private provider. It is registered to provide care for up to five children who may have emotional and/or social difficulties and/or learning disabilities.

The home was registered with Ofsted in February 2017. The manager was registered in September 2021. There is only one child currently living in the home.

Due to COVID-19 (coronavirus), at the request of the Secretary of State, we suspended all routine inspections of social care providers on 17 March 2020.

We last visited this setting on 17 May 2021 to carry out a monitoring visit. The report is published on our website.

The children's home is not yet delivering good help and care for children and young people. However, there are no serious or widespread failures that result in their welfare not being safeguarded or promoted.

Enforcement action since last inspection:

A monitoring visit was carried out on 24 February 2021 in response to information received by Ofsted which suggested potential breaches in regulations. Following the visit, Ofsted issued a restriction of accommodation notice to prevent any other children being admitted to the home. Three compliance notices were also issued under regulations 6, 12 and 13 to address the serious concerns relating to children being provided with poor and unsafe living conditions, poor risk management and widespread failings in the leadership and management of the home.

A monitoring visit was carried out on 6 April 2021 to review the action taken by the provider. There were no children living in the home. The inspector found that the provider had failed to meet all the steps in the compliance notices issued under regulations 12 and 13 and these were reissued. The restriction of accommodation notice remained in place.

A further monitoring visit was conducted on 17 May 2021 to review the action taken by the provider. There were no children living in the home. The inspector found that the provider had met all of the steps in the compliance notices issued under regulations 12 and 13. Ofsted lifted the restriction of accommodation notice.

Inspection judgements

Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: requires improvement to be good

There is one child currently living in the home. This child moved in after the last inspection. No other children have lived in the home since the last inspection.

There is a significant shortage of staff at the home. This has resulted in the manager serving notice on the child's placement soon after the child moved in. This additional move is an unsettling, poor experience for this child.

The home has been completely refurbished and is very well presented. There are a range of books and toys, including items for sensory play that are appealing to the child's specific interests.

Staff have registered the child with the necessary health professionals and take the child to routine medical appointments. The child is supported by the staff to see medical specialists for the child's more complex needs. The manager shares information gained from health professionals with her team to help them to understand how to support the child's health.

The manager has taken steps to help to find the child an education provision and secured educational taster days. However, there is insufficient information available to fully assess the requirement previously issued under regulation 8, the education standard. For this reason, this requirement has been reissued.

How well children and young people are helped and protected: requires improvement to be good

The manager had arranged for the staff to attend specialist training prior to the child's admission to help the staff to understand the child's needs. However, this training has not been effective in ensuring that all the staff are sufficiently skilled, knowledgeable or experienced to meet the child's assessed needs.

There have been no serious incidents or restraints during the child's placement. The manager ensures that there are always staff on shift who are appropriately trained in restraint should the need arise to help ensure the child's safety.

The manager scrutinises the administration of medication and addresses potential issues to improve the practice of her team. This helps to ensure that the child is safe.

Staff complete all the required health and safety checks and report maintenance issues, which are promptly addressed.



The child has been supported by the staff to complete a fire drill so that they know what to expect if a fire breaks out in the home. There is a personal emergency evacuation plan in place for the staff to follow to help them to understand how to support the child in an emergency.

The effectiveness of leaders and managers: inadequate

The significant turnover of staff has resulted in the remaining staff, including the manager, being required to work additional shifts. The use of agency staff has increased so that there are enough staff to care for the child. These measures are not sustainable and there is no suitable action plan to address the staffing issue. Consequently, the child must move out of the home.

The manager has failed to identify when further information is required from the child's placing local authority regarding the child's needs. The lack of information has not been challenged or escalated, limiting the information available to help the staff to understand the child's current needs.

Staff fail to use the systems in place to record daily observations of the child, limiting the information available to understand the child's current or emerging needs. The manager's attempts to address this issue with her team have been unsuccessful as failures to use these systems effectively continue.

The manager being required to provide a caring role in addition to her managerial tasks has had a negative impact on her ability to maintain effective monitoring systems. A suitable action plan is not in place to address this serious shortfall.



What does the children's home need to do to improve? Statutory requirements

raise any need for further assessment or specialist provision in relation to a child with the child's education or training provider and the child's placing authority;	
help a child who is excluded from school, or who is of compulsory school age but not attending school, to access educational and training support throughout the period of exclusion or non-attendance and to return to school as soon as possible;	
help each child to attend education or training in accordance with the expectations in the child's relevant plans.

ensure that the home's workforce provides continuity of care to each child;	
use monitoring and review systems to make continuous improvements in the quality of care provided in the home.
