What is it like to attend this early years setting?

This provision meets requirements

Children arrive happy and excited to see what is on offer at the holiday club. The friendly staff warmly welcome children and help them to settle quickly. They develop strong attachments with the staff. Children independently make choices about the activities they access on arrival. Older children are extremely supportive of their younger peers. For example, they include them in games, give demonstrations and help at lunchtime to open their food packaging. Children enjoy art and craft activities and playing with dough. They use their imaginations to make Halloween cakes and confidently tell the inspector about what they like doing.

Younger children enjoy sharing stories and hunt for the 'missing' club bear. They share their theories with staff, engage in meaningful conversations and investigate places that he might be hiding. Younger children squeal in delight when they find the bear and enjoy having cuddles with him. All children enjoy the exciting range of physical activities and games. They increase their skills and agility as they balance along obstacles, dribble footballs, run and jump. Children show high levels of engagement. Staff praise them for their achievements and regularly give 'high fives' and claps, which increases children's confidence.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The management team has a clear overview and ethos for the club. The staff share this passion and provide high-quality care and fun for the children. The club is well organised and is a supportive and social environment.
- The staff work extremely well together as a team. This ensures children's needs are met and they enjoy their time at the club. Staff get to know the children well and invest time in finding out what they like to do. Children are given opportunities to make suggestions and share their ideas. Staff use these to plan activities they know the children will enjoy. They use praise and encouragement and foster a culture of belonging. Children show elevated levels of confidence and independence.
- Parents speak highly of the club and know there is a broad range of activities on offer. They say their children are happy to attend and enjoy spending time with their friends. Parents feel the club is well organised and appreciate that the staff are caring and friendly. However, they would prefer more communication to keep them informed about their children's time at the club. The club works well in partnership with the host school the children attend.
- Staff are positive role models. They are kind and caring and listen to the children. Staff and children recap on the club rules together before starting the physical activities. Children listen well, know the expectations, and feel secure. Staff show children respect and are polite. Children behave extremely well and



- receive praise for their good manners.
- Staff deploy effectively to maintain ratios. They move between activities and help children as they play. Staff support children's communication and language skills. They introduce new vocabulary and encourage conversations.
- The management team use robust procedures for safer recruitment of staff and complete ongoing suitability checks. Staff complete an induction process and mandatory training during their probation period.
- The management team support staff with regular briefings to ensure staff all know their roles and responsibilities. They monitor ongoing development and provide feedback to ensure staff maintain high practice levels. Managers provide opportunities for staff to increase their skills and qualifications to improve sports activities for children further.
- Staff extend children's knowledge of healthy lifestyles. For example, children discuss the importance of drinking water to stay hydrated after exercise. They understand the importance of washing their hands at appropriate times and eating healthy snacks.
- The management team has plans to extend clubs into areas of deprivation and roll out further workshops at schools to increase employment for young people.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

The manager and staff have a good understanding of their roles and responsibilities in relation to safeguarding. Staff complete training and increase their knowledge of child protection and wider issues, such as radicalisation. They keep up to date with any changes in policies and guidelines. Staff know the signs which may indicate a child is at risk of harm and the procedures to follow if they have any concerns. They complete risk assessments to ensure the environment is safe for children. Regular headcounts take place when children move between areas. Staff monitor the premises as children arrive and exit the club.
