

# Inspection of Ready Steady Go Wrap Around Care

Youth Centre, Church Lane, Fradley, Lichfield, Staffordshire WS13 8NL

The quality and standards of early years provision

### What is it like to attend this early years setting?

### This provision does not meet requirements

There are significant weaknesses that put children at risk. The provider, who is also the manager, does not have sufficient knowledge about her role and responsibilities. She does not follow safe recruitment processes to ensure the suitability of staff. She fails to ensure that all staff are trained in the setting's safeguarding policy and procedures.

This said, children enjoy the time they spend at the after-school club. They joke and laugh with staff, when they arrive to collect them from school. Children warmly greet their friends and happily play together. Staff are friendly and show a positive interest in children as they join in with their play. Staff provide children with a wide range of interesting activities that children enjoy. Children recognise the importance of sharing the most popular resources with their friends, such as gaming equipment and tablets.

The provider supports children's health effectively. She ensures that children receive a nutritionally balanced cooked meal when they arrive at the setting. 'Teatime' is a sociable event and conversation flows easily between staff and children. The provider has implemented effective risk assessment in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, to help minimise the spread of infection. Children learn about good hygiene routines and the reasons for these.

### What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The provider has failed to identify and address weaknesses in the management of the setting and does not have a secure understanding of her legal responsibilities. Her self-evaluation is not effective. The recruitment procedures are not robust enough to ensure children's safety. The provider does not ensure that all written records are completed for the safe and effective running of the setting relating to safer recruitment. She has not obtained the criminal records check for all new staff employed at the setting. In addition, she does not consistently seek references for new staff or follow up on reference requests. This means that the suitability of staff cannot be assured and compromises children's safety.
- The provider has not appointed a named deputy to take charge in her absence, which is a is a breach of the legal requirements. This means that staff do not know who to go to should they need support or guidance about a matter relating to a child.
- The provider has some systems in place for the professional development of staff. However, the arrangements for the induction training of new staff is inadequate. She fails to provide new staff with the training they need to become



familiar with all the setting's policies and procedures, including safeguarding training. This means that new staff are not fully clear about their roles and responsibilities to keep children safe.

- Children are well motivated to play and enjoy relaxing with their friends. However, the routines at the start of the session slightly limit the opportunity for children to choose what they want to do and when to do it.
- Staff provide opportunities for children to build on their learning experiences in school. Children are keen to use their knowledge and skills, such as reading and writing, in their play. They make written signs for the role-play shop to show when it is open and closed. They enjoy sitting with friends to share a book. Children concentrate as they play board games and draw on their mathematical knowledge.
- Staff work in effective partnership with parents and the local school. Parents are complimentary about the service provided. Children explain how they love the staff, activities and food. Staff value the views of the children when they plan activities for them.
- Children enjoy opportunities to be physically active. They excitedly wait their turn to spin large hoops and chase after them. They play large ball games outdoors and enjoy friendly competition.
- Staff have high expectations of children. Children understand the rules and boundaries. They show respect to staff and to each other. For example, younger children enjoy the company and support from older children who attend the setting.
- Staff provide children with a wide range of opportunities to use technology. They have effective systems in place relating to keeping children safe when accessing the internet. Children learn about the potential risks when using devices online and how to keep themselves safe. Staff help them to learn about limits for screen time and the reasons for this.

### Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

Although the provider has recently focused on updating the safeguarding knowledge of staff, she fails to provide training in safeguarding processes and procedures for new staff. Staff know about potential signs that a child might be at risk. However, not all staff are clear about the actions they must take to report concerns about a child or an allegation about a member of staff. This puts children at risk because not all staff know who they need to report concerns to. Although some staff understand about indicators of extreme views and practices, the manager has not trained them in the 'Prevent' duty and is not familiar with the government documentation relating to this. This puts children at risk. The provider does not have rigorous vetting processes for new staff. This means that the suitability of staff cannot be assured and exposes children to potential risk.

### What does the setting need to do to improve?

### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector held discussions with the leaders, staff, children and parents.
- The inspector sampled some of the setting's documentation, including suitability checks, the safeguarding policy and procedures.
