Monitoring visit

Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

The home is owned and run by a private organisation. It provides care for up to six children. According to the home's statement of purpose, it caters for children who require therapeutic care and support.

The home has been without a registered manager since May 2019.

This monitoring visit

This monitoring inspection took place due to Ofsted receiving several concerning notifications from the provider. A previous monitoring visit took place on 25 November 2021. Two requirements were set because of that visit and remain in place.

The condition of the home has improved since the last monitoring visit. However, during the inspection, one child's bedroom floor was cluttered with clothing and other personal belongings, including some chocolate advent calendars. This represents a potential trip hazard for the child as well as being unhygienic because food items were being stored on the floor. The inspector asked the provider to help the child to sort these issues out during the inspection.

Another child's room has some paint all over the wall from some Halloween-themed decorations. Although it is positive that children can decorate their rooms to their individual tastes, no consideration has been given to helping the child to have a blank canvas to complete further artwork now that Halloween has passed. Another child's room has some unsightly patchwork and filler, which detracts from the otherwise homely touches in the room.

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An incident occurred in November 2021, in which the home's internet was disabled to discourage children from playing inappropriate online music. This was a measure which meant that all children, including those who were not involved in the incident, were prevented from enjoying their online activities.

Children are encouraged to live together harmoniously but the responsible individual recognises that this is not always possible. This has led to one child moving from the home to a temporary provision. The responsible individual has liaised with the placing authority but there is the risk of drift, delay and uncertainty. No firm resolution to the child's permanent placement has been established. Various meetings have been held and discussions with the social worker, independent reviewing officer and social work team manager are ongoing. However, the responsible individual has not escalated concerns to the placing authority, nor stressed the absolute urgency of the situation or the potential consequences for the child. Furthermore, the responsible individual has not ensured that the other children in the home have been adequately supported with understanding where the child went or the reasons why. This does not promote positive relationships between children, nor encourage a sense of attachment or security for children.

There have been two medication errors in October 2021. Medical attention was sought on both occasions. The provider completed detailed reports into both incidents and all staff are up to date with their medication training. However, these incidents show that there are key failings in the home's processes. There has been no formal review into these errors, so any learning has not been captured or acted upon.

There has been no registered manager in the home for over two years. A new manager has now been appointed and has been in the role for around four weeks. To date, no application to register has been sent to Ofsted. There are many practice areas that need improving and the new manager is working to identify the priority issues. A key, and continuing, shortfall is staff supervision, which has not taken place with any regularity. This is a missed opportunity to ensure that staff are working consistently and that there are no concerns from the staff which need addressing.
