Monitoring visit

Information about this children's home

This home is operated by a private provider. It provides care for up to two children with learning disabilities.

The home does not have a registered manager. The current manager was appointed on 1 September 2021. He is in the process of applying to register with Ofsted.

This monitoring visit

On 28 and 29 April 2021, Ofsted undertook a full inspection. The home was judged inadequate. In response to that visit, Ofsted issued a notice of restriction of accommodation.

On 14 June 2021, 22 July 2021, 23 August 202, 5 October 2021 and 9 November 2021, monitoring visits took place to monitor the notice of restriction. This had been adhered to. On 3 August 2021, a notice of decision to cancel the registration of the home was issued. On 16 October 2021, a third notice of restriction of accommodation was issued.

The purpose of this visit was to consider the home's adherence to the notice of restriction. The provider has adhered to the restriction of accommodation, and there are currently no children living at the home.

The manager who was appointed on 1 September 2021 is still in the process of applying to register with Ofsted. The current responsible individual is in the process of notifying Ofsted of his resignation and appointing the service manager to this role. The leadership of the home remains in a transitional stage and therefore its effectiveness is not yet fully understood.

Three staff have been recruited and are currently working in the provider's other home. Staff have completed relevant training to prepare them for when children move into the home. Additional training is planned. For example, staff will be

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completing training to use a new online recording system which is due to be introduced to the home.

The manager has failed to recruit all staff safely. Specifically, one staff member's previous employment history has not been explored sufficiently enough to ensure that employment dates provided are correct. The existing responsible individual and service manager had also failed to identify this error. This does not assure Ofsted that manager's monitoring systems are sufficient.

A new independent person has been appointed to undertake monthly audits of the home. This is a recent change and therefore it is not yet possible to determine that the requirement previously raised in relation to the independent person's reports has been met.

The home has been refurbished throughout. A new sensory room has been created and the staff office has been relocated. These changes mean that there is no longer suitable provision for a second member of staff to sleep in the home. A pull-out bed is provided for the second member of staff, but this bed it located in the living room, which is a communal space for children and staff to use. Staff are not provided with appropriate sleeping arrangements.

The manager has demonstrated some progress towards meeting the other requirements raised at the previous inspection, which include regulations 6, 12, 13, 14 and 26. As no children are living in the home, the effectiveness of the changes made to meet these requirements cannot be measured. Therefore, these requirements remain in place.
