Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

The home is owned and operated by a private organisation and can provide care for up to five children with social and emotional difficulties.

There has been no registered manager since October 2021.

Inspection date: 6 January 2022

This monitoring visit

A monitoring visit was conducted on 25 November 2021 due to a combination of concerning notifications and the sudden leaving of the registered manager.

A compliance notice, under regulation 13, with a due date of 2 January 2022 was issued following that inspection, and nine other requirements were made. Due to the serious nature of the concerns and Ofsted's conclusion that children were at serious risk of harm, Ofsted suspended the home's registration.

The purpose of this monitoring visit was to assess the provider's progress in meeting the compliance notice and to ensure that no children had lived in the home following the serving of the suspension notice. The provider's response to the other nine requirements was not a focus of this visit, and these are repeated.

In accordance with the compliance notice, the provider was required to undertake a review of the internal monitoring systems in place at the time of the previous inspection. This review was to include the roles and responsibilities of all senior leaders and managers in the organisation at the time of that inspection. Consideration for the review was to also include risk management processes for two children living in the home at the time of the inspection, the safer recruitment of staff, staff deployment and supervision. A written report with an action plan to improve practice was also required to conclude the compliance notice.

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In response to the compliance notice, a written report was completed by senior leaders and submitted to Ofsted. Although the review did include some areas of the compliance notice, it failed to provide a comprehensive response to all of the steps listed in the notice.

The provider's report identified that safer recruitment practice had been reviewed and an audit had been completed of all staff files to ensure that only suitably vetted staff are employed. However, the inspector's findings identified further shortfalls and gaps with regard to pre-employment checks and vetting processes. Consequently, the risk of unsafe staff working in the provider's children's homes remains.

The roles and responsibilities of senior leaders were detailed in the report. However, consideration has not been given to the manager and deputy manager who had oversight of the home at the time of the previous inspection and what their role and responsibilities were. Consequently, the impact of their input and practice during that time had neither been reviewed nor considered to inform lessons learned.

The provider's review of the risk management processes for children has only focused on specific areas. For example, one child's referral and admission process have been reviewed, but no review of this child's risk management plans has occurred to identify why and how this child was not protected from the significant risks that were apparent.

The review focused on an isolated incident and the rostering of staff redeployed from other homes operated by the provider. It does not demonstrate that the processes and practices that were in place at the time of previous inspection for redeployed staff have been reviewed and considered to identify gaps and generate learning to improve care practice.

A new rolling supervision system has been implemented by the provider. This is still in the developmental stages but shows some progress in staff having received practice-related supervision.

The provider has continued to comply with the suspension notice. No children have lived in the home since the notice was served. However, Ofsted remains concerned at the lack of progress that has been demonstrated by the provider to meet the steps detailed in the compliance notice. Consequently, the provider has failed to demonstrate that a thorough review has been completed to inform the necessary learning and improvement.

The compliance notice will be reissued to give the provider a further opportunity to demonstrate that the required progress has been made. The nine other requirements are also reissued, and the suspension notice remains in place.
