

Compliance action taken for childcare provision

Summary of outcome

All early years providers must meet the legal requirements in the Statutory framework for the early years foundation stage, which you can find at www.gov.uk/government/publications/early-years-foundation-stage-framework--2. If we find that a provider is not meeting the requirements, we can take action to ensure they put matters right.

On 14 October 2021, we carried out an inspection and found the provider was not meeting some of these requirements.

The overall effectiveness of the provision was judged to be inadequate. The inspection report sets out the actions the provider was required to take to meet the requirements. On 24 January 2022, we carried out a regulatory visit. The focus of the visit was to check whether the provider had met the safeguarding and welfare actions, raised at their last inspection. We found the provider had met some of the safeguarding and welfare actions but not others. They maintained relevant information about children in their care, as required. The provider had systems in place to work with other settings children attend.

However, we found that the provider had not met the all actions set in the welfare requirement notice. Additionally, during the regulatory visit on 24 January 2022, we found new areas of concern. This means that the provider was not meeting other requirements as set out in the Statutory framework for the early years foundation stage. We have served another welfare requirements notice. This is a legal notice that requires the provider to take the actions below within the timescales set out. The provider will be able to give parents further information about this.

Actions needed by 21 February 2022:

- ensure that risk assessments are thorough and identify all aspects of the environment that need to be checked on a regular basis
- maintain an accurate record of each child's hours of attendance
- gain a secure understanding of current safeguarding legislation and guidance, such as the 'Prevent' duty guidance
- undertake professional development opportunities to gain a secure understanding of how children learn and help improve the quality of education



■ provide Ofsted with a with all necessary information to allow them to carry out necessary checks on household members

We will monitor the provider's response to ensure the actions are successfully completed.
