What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is inadequate

Children's future success, their well-being and safety are compromised at this setting. The provider continues to fail to meet the requirements of registration and has failed to make rapid and sustained improvements. Care practices put children at risk of harm and do not teach them how to keep themselves safe. For example, staff do not place babies down to sleep safely and do not know how to safely carry and move them around. They do not make sure that equipment and resources are safe, and inaccessible to children, particularly in the garden.

Children are generally happy and enjoy some activities that staff provide for them. However, the quality of learning experiences and interactions from staff are inconsistent. For example, staff working with babies comment on their actions and follow their interests patiently. However, during group activities, staff rush through the activity, without paying attention to all children to help them to learn and extend their language. Nevertheless, babies show that they feel secure with their familiar adults and seek their reassurance when upset.

Some staff working with older children have the appropriate skills and they provide interesting activities. This helps some older children to develop fine motor skills and extend some of their language, for example during play dough activities. However, some children are left alone and without attention for too long. As with the younger children, some group activities are rushed through without the appropriate attention to children's interests and learning needs. These approaches do not foster children's positive attitude to learning. Nevertheless, older children behave well during the day.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The provider is unable to drive rapid improvement and meet the statutory requirements of the early years foundation stage (EYFS). Some of the breaches of the requirements found at this inspection have been raised before. This means that there continues to be weaknesses in the quality of the provision.
- Some staff do not have a good knowledge and understanding of the EYFS. They do not understand how to deliver good-quality early years education. Staff plan what they want children to learn next. However, this is not based on a sequence of development that will help the child to progress and achieve future next steps.
- The manager is working hard to implement changes and improve the quality of care and education provided to children. There are some positive changes and very ambitious plans in place for future improvements. However, these are in the early stages and require more effort from the manager and staff to ensure they have the desired impact.



- The provider has improved arrangements for the supervision of staff. Regular support meetings take place and there is now outside support to help the manager monitor the quality of the provision. However, improvements have not been rapid or effective enough. As a result, the weaknesses continue to occur.
- Staff have recently attended a variety of training courses to address weaknesses identified at the last inspection. However, there are still some gaps in their knowledge and understanding of health and safety and safeguarding. For example, they are not aware of up-to-date guidance on safe sleeping practices for babies. Consequently, staff place young babies on their front, with their faces on the mattress. which puts them at risk of harm. In addition, some staff do not know the safest ways of moving and carrying babies. For example, they move children around in ways which could cause an injury. Some staff do not carry babies safely to ensure they are supported and cannot slip from staff's arms. These unsafe practices could put children's health and safety at risk.
- The key-person system has improved. All children have an allocated key person who knows them well and is known to the child's parents or carers. In the key person's absence, the provider ensures that another key person can meet children's individual care and learning needs. However, the weaknesses in the quality of education mean that children's learning needs continue to not be met.
- Staff do not understand their role in supporting children whose home language is not English. They do not provide opportunities for children to develop and use their home language in play and learning. Furthermore, they do not support parents to understand the importance of promoting children's language at home.
- Parents provide positive feedback and express that they are satisfied with daily communication received from staff.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

All staff have attended safeguarding training. However, training has not been effective, as some staff are still unable to identify safeguarding concerns and follow the correct procedure. In addition, some staff do not know their responsibilities under the 'Prevent' duty or how to identify a child might be at risk of radicalisation. This puts children's well-being at risk. Moreover, staff do not identify and address hazards and risks to keep children safe. For example, during the inspection, the inspector identified a number of broken toys and equipment that staff did not identify and remove. This puts children's health and safety at risk.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action.
