What is it like to attend this early years setting?

This provision meets requirements

Children run across the playground to enthusiastically greet the childminder after their school day. They are clearly pleased to see her and receive a warm greeting. Children know the high expectations the childminder has for their behaviour and safety. Children thrive in knowing the consistent boundaries the childminder has for them. For instance, children know they must wear high-visibility jackets and walk sensibly in pairs to the childminder's house.

Children show they feel very secure in the childminder's care. They are highly independent as they access the extensive range of resources the childminder provides for them. Children make choices and decisions about what to do after their school day. The childminder provides cosy cushions and spaces for children who are tired and want a quiet space to relax. Children confidently ask questions, and seek help and reassurance from the childminder.

Older children are exceptionally caring towards the younger children. For example, they hold their hands as they walk to the childminder's house and offer to carry their school bags. Younger children clearly enjoy their company. All children play cooperatively and communicate very effectively as they negotiate for table space and resources. They demonstrate excellent social skills.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The childminder is exceptionally focused on making sure children are safe and happy in her care. She teaches children essential road safety skills from the earliest age. For example, the childminder makes excellent use of opportunities to talk about blind corners and explains to children about theses dangers. Children listen attentively and swiftly follow instructions. Their behaviour as they walk to the childminder's house is impeccable.
- The childminder encourages children to be independent. They clearly know the routines when they return to the house. Children know to safely store their bags and coats, and thoroughly wash their hands before entering the playroom. This helps to keep everyone safe.
- Children enjoy the freedom of an inviting playroom where they can relax after school. They enjoy exploring the range of craft resources the childminder provides. She demonstrates and teaches children new techniques with paint. Children are eager to try to shadow paint, for example, with encouragement and praise from the childminder for their efforts. They show a 'can do' attitude to new ideas and activities.
- Mealtimes are relaxed social events. Children hold lively conversations with each other and the childminder as they discuss a range of topics. The childminder



invites all children to contribute. Children remind each other to use quiet voices when they are excited and the volume rises. Their behaviour is excellent and their manners are exemplary.

- The childminder supports children to settle in to her setting with visits before they begin school. She asks them what they like to do and play with, and what they like to eat. The childminder ensures children's favourite meals are served during their first few days at her house. This helps to reassure children and give them confidence as they start in her care.
- The childminder works very effectively in partnership with parents and schools. She passes on messages and information between teachers and parents. This helps to maintain excellent continuity and consistency for children's care and learning.
- Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the childminder has reviewed her arrangements for parents dropping off and collecting their children to reduce contact. She keeps parents informed about her service through regular and informative newsletters. Parents report the childminder is exceptional in the way she keeps their children safe. They also comment on the dedication and effort the childminder takes to 'enrich' their children's lives. Parents say, 'The childminder is amazing.'
- The childminder makes effective use of training to develop her knowledge and reflect on her practice. She ensures she has resources to interest all of the different children she cares for. The childminder continually reviews the resources and activities she offers to help children stay motivated and enjoy their time in her care.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

The childminder fully understands her role to keep children in her care safe. She recognises what signs children may show if they are at risk of abuse. The childminder knows the procedures to follow if she has any concerns about children's welfare. She attends regular training and has an effective safeguarding policy to help her daily practice. The childminder ensures the premises are clean and safe for children. She makes effective use of risk assessments to help identify and minimise risks to children.

Inspection activities
