### Information about this children's home

This privately owned home provides care and accommodation for up to three children with emotional and/or behavioural difficulties.

The home's manager has been in post since November 2021 and has applied to be registered.

## The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged requires improvement to be good at the last full inspection. At the interim inspection, Ofsted judges that it has declined in effectiveness.

Some management systems are not effective. Staff have not received regular supervision, maintenance issues have not been reported quickly and the monitoring of staff performance has not identified potential weaknesses.

Staff have failed to take all the necessary steps to keep children safe. Children have been able to leave their bedrooms in the early hours of the morning without staff being aware. Protocols designed to keep the child safe have not been followed. For example, staff are not aware that children have left their room at night, despite the use of door alarms. During an incident at night in which children were not supervised, children were harmed.

On another occasion, a lack of effective supervision meant that a child took a potentially dangerous object from the staff office. The object was not stored securely.

In some cases, staff have been unable to set or enforce boundaries for children. Some staff have reported feeling anxious about challenging the behaviour of children. This has meant that children have not felt safe and secure.

When concerns about staff conduct were raised with managers, they did not take action to assess and minimise potential risks to children.

At the last inspection, it was identified that staff are not completing the relevant qualification quickly enough. This is still the case. Staff have still not seen their assessor, had study tasks given to them or had their work reviewed. Arrangements for staff training have improved but there are still gaps in training for some staff, particularly in areas specific to the needs and risks of children.

Some parts of the home are well decorated and provide a homely environment for children. However, other parts of the home are worn and not clean. Maintenance systems are not effective. As a result, damage is not repaired quickly enough.

This relates to the oversight of staff practice, staff supervision and staff development.	
For the purposes of paragraph (3)(b), an individual who works in the home in a care role has the appropriate qualification if, by the relevant date, the individual has attained—	21 March 2022
the Level 3 Diploma for Residential Childcare (England) ("the Level 3 Diploma"); or	

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a qualification which the registered person considers to be equivalent to the Level 3 Diploma.

The relevant date is—

in the case of an individual who starts working in a care role in a home after 1st April2014, the date which falls 2 years after the date on which the individual started working in a care role in a home; or

in the case of an individual who was working in a care role in a home on 1st April 2014, 1st April 2016. (Regulation 32 (4)(a)(b) (5)(a)(b))

This specifically relates to the manager ensuring that all staff enrolled on the level 3 qualification are supported to make progress. Additionally, the manager must take the necessary action to ensure that staff who are out of timescales with the level 3 qualification are supported to complete this.

#### Recommendations

- The registered person must ensure that staff are familiar with the home's policies on record-keeping and understand the importance of careful, objective and clear recording. Staff should record information about individual children in a non-stigmatising way that distinguishes between fact, opinion and third-party information. Information about the child must always be recorded in a way that will be helpful to the child. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 62, paragraph 14.4)
- The registered person must ensure that the home is a nurturing and supportive environment that meets the needs of the children. Children's homes will, in most cases, be homely, domestic environments. The home must comply with relevant health and safety legislation, such as alarms and food hygiene. However, in doing so, the home should seek as far as possible to maintain a domestic rather than 'institutional' impression. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 15, paragraph 3.9)
