### What is it like to attend this early years setting?

#### The provision is outstanding

Children are extremely valued by deeply nurturing staff, who have very high expectations of them all. As a result, all children, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities, make very rapid progress. Children demonstrate that they feel safe at nursery. They behave exceptionally well and form respectful relationships. Staff have organised calming and self-regulation stations around the nursery to support children to express their emotions. Children speak with articulation and confidence, as staff actively encourage and value what they say. For example, during free-play activities, children eagerly share news about their recent trip to a local museum, discussing how they travelled there.

Children become deeply absorbed in rich learning experiences. Children join staff to plan an innovative and challenging curriculum, which stimulates their curiosity. For instance, as children re-enact a familiar story as part of their outdoor learning, they proudly describe the sea creature they will be. Children are highly motivated individuals, who immerse themselves in their play and learning. They demonstrate increasing independence throughout the day. Children show an understanding of how to keep themselves safe. For instance, children clearly understand what is expected of them when they go to the local common for outdoor activities. They confidently put on their high-visibility jackets, and join in the song as they each hold their section of the walking rope.

# What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Staff expertly deliver a coherent and well-sequenced curriculum. They tailor learning to children's needs and interests. Children are highly motivated by the exciting and captivating activities. They become deeply involved in their learning as they excitedly work together to create a 'helicopter' story. Staff extend children's learning with excellent levels of challenge. For example, children are encouraged to use more descriptive words as they add the character of a walrus to the story.
- Staff place a considerable emphasis on encouraging children to make their own choices and explore their uniqueness. Staff promote inclusion and avoid gender stereotyping when planning activities. For example, staff learn about children's cultures from their parents when children start, and reflect this in nursery life. Children learn about cultures which are different to their own, such as when staff take them to visit local museums.
- Leaders and staff provide a rich set of experiences, to help broaden children's life skills. For example, children enjoy weekly ballet sessions. They express their delight as they join the ballet teacher. Children listen to instructions and follow these accurately. They actively display their advancing physical skills as they move in different ways, strengthening their core muscles.



- Staff recognise that the range of vocabulary that children acquire early on has a lasting impression on their future learning. They have set up 'word pyramids' to extend children's vocabulary, introducing words that children are not as familiar with. Staff nurture children's love of books. Children take books home each week and staff regularly use books to support children's learning even further.
- Staff capture the voices of children superbly. They gather children's ideas and opinions about nursery life. Staff meet with children to discuss what they like to do or change at nursery. Children's voices are represented throughout the displays in the nursery. This promotes children's communication and language in a meaningful way. It also helps children to gain a sense of pride and belonging at their nursery.
- Parents describe the nursery as 'amazing', and the leader and staff as 'exceptional'. They say that staff go above and beyond to support their children with their learning. Parents are supported from the first settling-in visit, and staff ensure that children and parents are happy and comfortable. Parents have confidence in the progress their children are making. They comment that their children thrive at the setting. Staff help parents to understand what their children are learning and how to support their future learning.
- Leadership and management are extremely strong. Staff consistently report high levels of support for their well-being. There is effective engagement with staff through supervision sessions and focused actions for professional development. There are strong shared values between leaders and staff. This is evident through the quality of practice, which ensures that children receive the highest quality of education.

# **Safeguarding**

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

The leaders and staff team have a robust understanding of the possible signs and symptoms of abuse. They have an effective knowledge of a broad range of safeguarding concerns, including extremist beliefs and radicalisation. Staff know how to act swiftly to report any concerns and allegations about adults who may be at risk to children. They regularly attend training and complete courses to ensure that their knowledge is up to date. There are robust recruitment procedures in place. Leaders and managers make sure that staff remain suitable to work with children.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector spoke to staff at appropriate times during the inspection.
- The principal showed the inspector documentation to demonstrate the suitability of staff.

The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
