## Summary of key findings

### This provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her responsibility to keep children safe. She knows how to recognise indicators that a child may be at risk of harm. The childminder knows the correct procedures to refer any concerns to external agencies about a child's welfare. The childminder has a current paediatric first-aid certificate.
- The childminder has developed strategies to ensure she keeps up to date with early years information and child protection issues. She considers how she will evaluate her service to drive improvement.
- The childminder knows how to assess children's learning and the importance of sharing information with parents. She successfully explains what she intends children to learn and how she will plan a sequenced curriculum to build on what they know and can do.
- The childminder effectively explains how she will encourage children's positive behaviour. She says she will promote British values and encourage all children to share and take turns with toys.
- The childminder understands the importance of promoting children's uniqueness. She says she will provide experiences and activities to value diversity and take children out every day, such as to local parks and children centres, to help promote children's sense of identity within the community.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

### Inspection activities

- This was the first routine inspection of the provider since the COVID-19 pandemic began. The inspector discussed the impact of the pandemic with the provider and has taken that into account in their evaluation of the provider.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder what she will intend children to learn and how this will have an impact on children's overall development and assessments for children.
- Documentation was viewed by the inspector. For example, the paediatric first-aid certificate and public liability insurance.
- A tour of the premises used for the purpose of childminding was completed by the inspector and with the childminder.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
