Monitoring visit

Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

### Information about this children's home

This children's home is run by a private organisation in partnership with the local authority. The home provides placements for children with disabilities and young people with a diagnosis of autism spectrum disorder that might result in behaviours of concern. The home provides care for up to six children and young people permanently, and up to six children and young people under short-break arrangements.

The home has been without a registered manager since July 2021.

The inspector was aware during this inspection that a whistle-blowing complaint, made since the previous inspection, is under investigation by the appropriate authorities. While Ofsted does not have the power to investigate complaints of this kind, actions taken by the setting in response to the complaint were considered alongside other evidence available at the time of the inspection to inform the inspector's judgements.

### This monitoring visit

This visit was undertaken to address specific concerns received by Ofsted and following a provider-led investigation submitted to Ofsted. The provider's response raised concerns about management monitoring and oversight of the home.

The requirements made at the full inspection in September 2021 were judged to be met. The condition of the home is now improved and is free from hazards. Several areas of the home have been redecorated, which has made the environment more homely, comfortable and welcoming. However, the children's bathrooms and the main kitchen need refurbishment. Managers have recognised this and have improvement plans in place.



The systems for administering and recording medication have been reviewed and amended to promote safe practice. Bespoke medication training has been provided to staff to ensure that they are competent in all aspects of the medication administration process. Managers complete daily medication stock checks and monthly medication audits. Changes to medication procedures have reduced the risk of medication errors.

Following an incident of a staff member using their own mobile phone inappropriately, action has been taken by the manager to ban staff from using phones when they are working with children. An unintended consequence is that staff now do not have a means of calling colleagues for help when they are supporting children who are struggling to manage their emotions. Managers have failed to identify a new strategy to ensure that staff have an appropriate means of communication while on shift working with children.

Managers have responded robustly to significant incidents, and they have taken steps to reduce the risk of a recurrence. However, there have been avoidable delays between serious incidents occurring and managers notifying Ofsted. This means the regulator has been unable to monitor and evaluate responses to serious incidents in a timely way and ensure the safety and well-being of children and regulatory compliance.

On one occasion since the last inspection, leaders and managers agreed that the independent person did not need to carry out their monthly visit. As a result, the provider has not demonstrated an understanding of the importance of monthly visits by an independent person to ensure that children's safety and well-being are being promoted.

Staff report good support from managers. The manager has effective monitoring systems in place to ensure that staff receive regular, meaningful supervision.

Managers are actively recruiting to fill vacant care staff posts. In the interim, managers fill rota gaps themselves or with staff who know the children well. This ensures there is no impact on the quality of care the children receive.

There is currently no registered manager at the home. The manager in day-to-day charge of the home has been appointed since the last inspection. She is in the process of applying to register with Ofsted.

The registered person must ensure that an independent person visits the children's home at least once each month.

When the independent person is carrying out a visit, the registered person must help the independent person—

if they consent, to interview in private such of the children, their parents, relatives and persons working at the home as the independent person requires; and

to inspect the premises of the home and such of the home's records (except for a child's case records, unless the child and the child's placing authority consent) as the independent person requires.

A visit by the independent person to the home may be unannounced.

The independent person must produce a report about a visit ("the independent person's report") which sets out, in particular, the independent person's opinion as to whether—

children are effectively safeguarded; and

the conduct of the home promotes children's well-being.

The independent person's report may recommend actions that the registered person may take in relation to the home and timescales within which the registered person must consider whether or not to take those actions. (Regulation 44 (1) (2)(a)(b) (3) (4)(a)(b) (5))

■ For children's homes to be nurturing and supportive environments that meet the needs of their children, they will, in most cases, be homely, domestic environments. ('Guide to the Children's Homes Regulations, including the quality standards', page 15, paragraph 3.9)
