Information about this children's home

The children's home is one of several homes operated by a large private company. It is registered to provide care for up to three children with social, emotional and/or mental health difficulties.

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged requires improvement to be good at the last full inspection. At this interim inspection, Ofsted judged that it has declined in effectiveness.

Individual risk management plans in place for each child do not provide staff with clear strategies to address all known risks. There has been an increase in the number of episodes of one child going missing, with the associated risks, including child criminal exploitation, not being fully addressed. Staff are not currently able to contact the child if they are missing from the home. Although there is effective communication with strategy agencies, staff are not able to adequately safeguard the child.

All three children have struggled with self-injurious behaviour since the last inspection, although this has reduced over the same period. However, staff have undertaken limited direct work to support each child to understand what is being communicated by these behaviours. The consultation provided by the in-house clinical team in relation to one child is not included in their individual health plans.

There has been some progress for one child since the last inspection. However, due to increasing concerns, there is now an appropriate plan to review the suitability of their placement. One child has been engaging well in their education, which is positive progress. Another child has not had an educational placement. Staff are struggling to engage the child in formal online learning. The registered manager has not effectively challenged the delay in an educational provision being identified.

One child's emotional needs linked to their difficulties in engaging in education are understood well by staff. The child has now been offered appropriate specialist support. However, the advice provided to staff by the in-house clinical team has not been followed. The child's plans do not reflect the guidance provided. As a result, the child's physical health needs are not being appropriately supported.

Following the last full inspection, the garage overhead door has not been fixed. The planned gym facilities in the garage have not been provided to children. The window in one child's bedroom has not been fixed. However, plans were agreed during the inspection for this to be fixed. The kitchen has not yet been refitted.

Staff have been provided with further training and development following the last inspection. However, not all staff have completed training to provide them with the skills to identify and respond to signs of children using illegal substances. This means the staff are not equipped with the knowledge and skills to meet the needs and escalating vulnerabilities of one child living in the home.



The registered manager did not complete a learning review following a significant incident when two children left the home overnight through one child's bedroom window. This is important, as staff did not know the children had left until the following morning. Some of the measures in place to help staff to monitor children in the home are not working, including door alarms and the external CCTV system. The registered manager is unable to access recordings and thus was unable to review the CCTV footage. There is a lack of effective management monitoring and oversight of the impact of the quality of care provided to children.

The responsible individual has identified a new manager for the home. There is a plan for a transition period to ensure an effective handover is provided by the current registered manager prior to them leaving their post.

There have been no allegations made regarding staff. However, there were two significant incidents which were not notified to Ofsted. This reduces oversight from the regulator.
