Information about this children's home

This children's home provides care for up to three children who may have social, emotional and behavioural difficulties. At the time of the inspection there were three children living here.

The home has been without a registered manager since September 2021. The manager in post has not swiftly submitted a complete application to register with Ofsted as required.

Inspection judgements

Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: inadequate

The experiences of children in this home remain mixed due to ongoing concerns identified at several inspections regarding the inability of leaders and managers to sustain necessary improvements. There is an unacceptable delay in the manager applying to register with Ofsted. This lack of strong registered leadership and effective support from senior leaders means that actions required to develop the quality of care are not prioritised.

At the time of the inspection, there were three children living in the home. One child had recently moved into the home. Another child had returned to the home after a move to a new placement had failed. The third child has lived in the home for four years.

Of the three children, only one is in full-time education, with good attendance. Virtual education is being arranged as an interim measure for the child who has recently moved into the home. The third child had completed a 16-week course during this inspection period, as well as obtaining employment. However, both have now come to an end and further efforts by staff to motivate and engage the child have proved unsuccessful. The child is not currently in education or employment.

Planning for children to move into and out of the home is also mixed. Professionals told the inspector that when children move in or out of this home staff have worked flexibly and children have settled well. However, independence planning for one child has been too slow to prepare them effectively for adulthood. Plans are missing or lacking sufficient detail to ensure routine for the child and consistency across the staff team.

Children's health appointments are prioritised by staff. The inspector found that staff are creative in encouraging children to attend health appointments and ensuring they are up to date with their vaccinations.

The home lacks a homely feel. There are no photos or personal touches in the shared spaces outside the children's bedrooms. Children's bedrooms were also in a poor state of tidiness and cleanliness.

How well children and young people are helped and protected: inadequate

The safety of children in this home is seriously compromised. Leaders and managers do not have a clear plan about how to safely keep lighters in this home. This is significant as the property is thatched and there is a greater risk of fire. The inspector found one child had multiple lighters in their bedroom. Staff and managers were unaware of this situation, further demonstrating poor oversight and maintenance of children's bedrooms.



One child has had multiple incidents of going missing. While the child has a personalised plan for such occasions, staff do not follow this effectively. Leaders and managers have failed to review these incidents effectively to identify ways to reduce the incidents and increase safety.

Staff are challenged by one child's behaviour, and this has led to an unhelpful and unsafe dynamic within the home. Some staff feel unable to challenge or set boundaries for fear of the possible repercussions. This means that the staff are not always in control and children are not consistently helped to behave positively.

Children's records are of poor quality. Important information on how to care for children is missing and use of jargon or ambiguous language makes records unclear.

Children's memories and experiences in this home are not captured in a meaningful way. Staff have not taken enough action to ensure that important memorabilia is kept and stored safely.

Feedback from a parent was positive. They spoke highly of the team and recognised the efforts that staff have made for their child. They also felt that they had good communication with the staff and are kept well informed.

The effectiveness of leaders and managers: inadequate

There is no registered manager in this home. An appointed manager has been in day-to-day charge since September 2021. No complete application has yet been received to register with Ofsted. It is an offence to manage and operate a home without registration. Senior leaders have not taken enough action to ensure an application is submitted swiftly.

Shortfalls are evident in relation to the effective management and oversight of the home and the quality of care. Requirements have been made about these shortfalls at all of the last six inspections and monitoring visits, and have been subject to compliance notices in January 2021 and again in March 2021. Insufficient action has been taken by leaders and managers to embed changes to staff practice; improvements made are short-lived and have not been sustained. Two compliance notices have been issued because of the findings at this inspection.

When incidents have occurred, management oversight has been weak. Staff do not routinely receive debriefs and opportunities to reflect are missed. When managers have identified actions to take, these have lacked clarity and focus and have not been robust enough to bring about positive change and improve outcomes for children.

Following a significant incident when a child went missing, leaders and managers completed a thorough review to identify learning and sought to address the gaps through training. As part of this process, staff received a debrief and were appropriately challenged. However, this learning has not been applied to subsequent



incidents of children going missing. Ongoing oversight is insufficient, and leaders and managers have failed to recognise that practice has not improved and that protocols are still not followed. This lack of learning places children at continuing risk of harm.

The inspector found some mandatory staff training to be out of date for some staff, including the deputy manager. Leaders and managers monitoring had not identified this weakness.

Staff told the inspector that they enjoy working in this home and describe the staff team as a 'family', who work well together.

Repeated breaches of regulation have been identified at this inspection. These relate to the management of the home and the quality of care. In addition, new areas of concern were identified concerning, fire safety, missing from home and care planning. Ofsted will continue to monitor this home closely and undertake additional inspections.
