

Compliance action taken for childcare provision

Summary of outcome

Her Majesty's Chief Inspector of Education, Children's Services and Skills is leading Ofsted's work into how regulated early years and childcare providers in England have delivered child-centred practice and care, within the context of the restrictions placed on society during the COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic.

All early years providers must meet the legal requirements in the [Statutory framework for the early years foundation stage](#). If we find that a provider is not meeting the requirements, we can take action to ensure they put matters right.

On 23 March 2022, we carried out an inspection and found the provider was not meeting some of these requirements. The overall effectiveness of the provision was judged to be inadequate. The inspection report sets out the actions the provider was required to take to meet the requirements.

On 12 April 2022, we carried out a regulatory visit. The focus of the visit was to check whether the provider had met the safeguarding and welfare actions, raised at their last inspection. We found the provider had met some of the safeguarding and welfare actions but not others. We have therefore served a welfare requirements notice. This is a legal notice that requires the provider to take the actions below within the timescales set out. The provider will be able to give parents further information about this. The provider is still registered with Ofsted.

Actions needed by 17 May 2022:

ensure staff manage behaviour in an appropriate way

ensure all staff provide children with warm and positive interactions to help build their self-esteem and develop confidence in their own abilities to promote their emotional well-being

provide support, coaching and training so that all staff understand their roles and responsibilities.

On 19 May 2022, we carried out a regulatory visit. The focus of the visit was to check whether the provider had met the safeguarding and welfare actions, raised at their last visit.

We found that the provider has improved their arrangements to provide support, coaching and training to assist staff in their understanding of their roles and responsibilities, developed practice to manage children's behaviour effectively and establish a key person system to promote children's well-being.

We are satisfied the provider has met the safeguarding and welfare actions raised. The provider is still registered with Ofsted.
