# **Summary of key findings**

#### This provision meets requirements

- The childminder's home is free from hazards. She understands how to keep children safe in her home and during outings, to minimise the risk of accidents and injuries.
- The childminder understands how to provide an inclusive and welcoming environment for all children. She discusses how she will place importance on making sure that children understand how they are unique, as well as respecting the similarities and differences in others.
- The childminder discusses the range of resources she would use to support children of all ages in their play and learning. She understands the importance of finding out about children's interests in order to provide resources that engage and motivate them during their play.
- The childminder understands her responsibility to safeguard children. She knows the signs and symptoms that would give her concern about a child's welfare and safety. The childminder describes the actions she would take if she had concerns.
- The childminder shows an understanding of how to assess children's development. She describes how she will use her observations effectively to prepare children for the next stage in their learning.
- The childminder has a good understanding of how to positively manage children's behaviour. She describes the clear boundaries she will set and how she will help children to understand why rules are important.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents and carers, including sharing ways to support children's development at home. She describes how she will encourage parents to play an active role in their child's early education.
- The childminder understands how to evaluate her own practice with the input of parents and carers, to help her strive for continuous improvement.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's healthy lifestyles, such as with food choices and opportunities to exercise.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

#### **Inspection activities**

- This was the first routine inspection the provider received since the COVID-19 pandemic began. The inspector discussed the impact of the pandemic with the provider and has taken that into account in her evaluation of the provider.
- The childminder showed the inspector around her home to discuss how she uses different areas for children's learning, and to check the safety and suitability of the premises.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation, including evidence of the suitability of all persons living at the setting.
- The childminder and the inspector discussed the childminder's understanding of keeping children safe and how she evaluates her practice.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.
