Information about this children's home

This privately run children's home is registered to provide care for up to four children. The provider states in their statement of purpose that they provide care for children who have been involved in gangs or in persistent and serious offending behaviour, and children at risk of or involved with radicalisation.

There is currently no registered manager in post.

This monitoring visit

Following an inadequate judgement made after the inspection on 28 and 29 July 2020, senior leaders made the decision to close the home. This was to provide an opportunity to review care practices, recruit a stable staff team and ensure that managers and staff attend relevant training sessions to understand their roles and responsibilities in protecting children.

The provider contacted Ofsted to indicate that they were ready to reopen. This monitoring visit took place to review the actions taken by the provider since the previous visit.

A new manager has been recruited and has applied to register. There is a new team of staff in place who have attended extensive training to ensure that they understand the expectations of their roles and are clear about their roles and responsibilities in safeguarding and protecting children.

The home environment has improved. The home is warm and welcoming, with brightly coloured soft furnishings and pictures throughout. Children's bedrooms have been decorated and are ready for children to move into.

Based on the outcomes of the visit, the home is ready to reopen and the request to vary the conditions of registration is agreed.

assess whether each child is at risk of harm, taking into account information in the child's relevant plans, and, if necessary, make arrangements to reduce the risk of any harm to the child;	
have the skills to identify and act upon signs that a child is at risk of harm;	
understand the roles and responsibilities in relation to protecting children that are assigned to them by the registered person;	
take effective action whenever there is a serious concern about a child's welfare; and	
that the home's day-to-day care is arranged and delivered so as to keep each child safe and to protect each child effectively from harm; and	
that the premises used for the purpose of the home are designed, furnished and maintained so as to protect each child from avoidable hazards to the child's health. (Regulation 12 (1) (2)(a)(i)(iii)(v)(vi)(b)(d))	
The manager needs to ensure that children's risk assessments are up to date and include all known risks, with strategies included to reduce risk.	



The leadership and management standard is that the registered person enables, inspires and leads a culture in relation to the children's home that—	19 October 2021
helps children aspire to fulfil their potential; and	
promotes their welfare.	
In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to—	
lead and manage the home in a way that is consistent with the approach and ethos, and delivers the outcomes, set out in the home's statement of purpose;	
ensure that staff work as a team where appropriate;	
ensure that staff have the experience, qualifications and skills to meet the needs of each child;	
ensure that the home has sufficient staff to provide care for each child; and	
understand the impact that the quality of care provided in the home is having on the progress and experiences of each child and use this understanding to inform the development of the quality of care provided in the home. (Regulation 13 (1) (2)(a)(b)(c)(d)(f))	
The registered person must—	14 September 2021
ensure that each employee completes an appropriate induction. (Regulation 33 (1)(a))	2021
The registered person must maintain records ("case records") for each child which—	14 September 2021
include information and documents listed in Schedule 3 in relation to each child;	
are kept up to date; and	
are signed and dated by the author of each entry. (Regulation 36 (1)(a)(b)(c))	



The registered person must complete a review of the quality of care provided for children ("a quality of care review") at least every 6 months.

In order to complete a quality of care review, the registered person must establish and maintain a system for monitoring, reviewing and evaluating—

the quality of care provided for children;

the feedback and opinions of children about the children's home, its facilities and the quality of care they receive in it; and

any actions that the registered person considers necessary in order to improve or maintain the quality of care provided for children.

After completing a quality of care review, the registered person must produce a written report about the quality of care review and the actions which the registered person intends to take as a result of the quality of care review ("the quality of care review report")

The registered person must—

supply to HMCI a copy of the quality of care review report within 28 days of the date on which the quality of care review is competed; and

make a copy of the quality of care review report available on request to a placing authority, if the placing authority is not the parent of a child accommodated in the home.

The system referred to in paragraph (2) must provide for ascertaining and considering the opinions of children, their parents, placing authorities and staff. (Regulation 45 (1) (2)(a)(b)(c) (3) (4)(a)(b) (5))
