Monitoring visit

Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

#### Information about this children's home

This home is privately owned and provides care for up to three children who have experienced childhood instability leading to trauma and associated complex behaviours.

The home has been without a registered manager since June 2021.

Inspection date: 7 June 2022

#### This monitoring visit

Ofsted last visited the home to complete a full inspection on 20 and 21 April 2022. At the inspection, serious and widespread failures were found that meant children were not protected or their welfare promoted. The home was judged inadequate.

Due to the significant concerns found during the inspection, Ofsted issued 13 requirements and two compliance notices, under regulation 12 (the protection of children standard) and regulation 13 (the leadership and management standard).

Ofsted also issued a notice of suspension of a children's home. This means that no children can live in the home.

This monitoring visit took place to review the actions managers have taken to meet the compliance notices and requirements.

During the visit, the inspector found that some improvement has been made and the requirements under regulations 11, 12, 23, 26 and 40 have been met. One compliance notice, under regulation 12 (the protection of children standard) has also been met. However, shortfalls remain in some aspects of leadership and management. As a result, the compliance notice has been issued again under regulation 13 (the leadership and management standard).

Managers have taken action to review and update children's risk management plans. Risk assessments set out relevant information and guidance. This helps staff to understand children's known risks and act in accordance with the risk assessments.

Managers carry out lessons learned exercises when reviewing incidents. This enables managers and staff to learn from previous incidents and support children effectively when they struggle with their emotions.

Staff access a wide range of training to meet children's complex needs and to keep them safe. All staff have received training in safeguarding, responding to bullying behaviours, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, autism spectrum disorder, self-harm, harmful sexualised behaviour, radicalisation, and child criminal and sexual exploitation. Consequently, staff are provided with the skills to care for and to safeguard the children in their care.

Managers have developed recording forms for staff to complete if there are signs of bullying in the home. This provides prompts for staff and informs them of the required action to take. Additional resources are available for children to use as part of preventative work to educate them in the zero-tolerance approach to bullying.

Improvements mean that systems are now in place to ensure that the storage and recording of medication is robust. All members of staff have received additional training in administering medication. A controlled drug medication cabinet is now available in the office and staff are required to record all controlled drugs in the controlled drug medicine book. This means that staff now have the means and knowledge to store and record medication in line with the organisation's medication policy.

Additional safer recruitment checks have been conducted with regard to the responsible individual. The provider has now fully verified the reasons for them leaving previous employments and has assured themselves that the responsible individual has the skills and expertise for the role.

Managers notify Ofsted of significant incidents in a timely way. Managers have also introduced systems that support them to review the quality of care provided at the home.

Despite this good progress, managers have yet to make sufficient progress in other areas to meet three requirements.

Maintenance work is ongoing. During the visit, the inspector observed works being undertaken to improve children's bedrooms. Managers informed the inspector that further improvements are planned, for example, a new bathroom suite is to be purchased and fitted.



The manager's and responsible individual's revised internal monitoring system is yet to be implemented. Progress has been made in creating new auditing tools, however, these have not been actioned. This means that managers are not able to assess and review the impact of the quality of care in the home.

There are continued failings in staff supervision. Managers fail to ensure that all staff receive supervision in line with the organisation's supervision policy. For example, one member of staff who is currently in their probation period has not received formal supervision since April. This is despite the organisation's expectation that staff on probation are to be supervised every two weeks.

The home continues to have no permanent manager, following the resignation of the manager immediately after the full inspection.

Following this monitoring visit, the notice of suspension remains in place. One compliance notice has been reissued, as regulation 13 (the leadership and management standard) has not been met in full. Eight requirements have been raised. Requirements under regulations 6, 13, 28 and 33 have been raised again, having not been met in full. Requirements under regulations 8, 10, 14 and 35 have not been reviewed at this visit and will be reviewed at the next inspection.
