

# Childminder report

#### **Summary of key findings**

#### This provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder has failed to keep her safeguarding training and knowledge up to date. As a consequence, she does not have an adequate understanding of how to recognise the signs and symptoms that children may be at risk of harm. The childminder is unsure of potential welfare concerns for children and how to access further support for children and families. The childminder does not understand the process to follow in the case of an allegation against her or a member of her household. This could place children at risk.
- The childminder does not hold a relevant paediatric first-aid certificate. As such, children's safety would be compromised while in her care.
- The childminder's home is not equipped with resources to enable children to make progress in their learning and development. The childminder does not have a clear vision of the type of curriculum she would offer if she had children in her care or how she would ensure their progression against the prime areas of learning. She does not have a robust understanding of how to plan learning activities for young children.
- The childminder does not have a reflective approach to her provision. She is not able to assess the strengths and areas for development of her practice. This prevents her from accessing relevant training, which would improve the quality of care and education. This lack of oversight has also led to several breaches to the statutory requirements.
- The childminder has an awareness of what children need to eat as part of a healthy diet. She can describe how she would support children's physical and emotional health. For example, by offering a balanced diet and by ensuring children's well-being is promoted and monitored. She is aware of the importance of regular handwashing and would model this to children.
- The childminder has failed to ensure that the premises are suitable and safe The environment is not conducive to children's safe exploration for learning. For example, there are discarded metal tools outdoors that could cause injury. Rubbish is discarded at the front of the property. In addition, uneven paving flags present a trip hazard. This could significantly compromise children's safety.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

# What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is not meeting requirements and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action.
