What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is good

The nursery provides a calm, happy and sociable atmosphere. Children are warmly welcomed as they arrive to start their day. They develop close bonds with staff, which allows them to feel safe, secure and ready to learn. There is a broad range of activities on offer for the children. Babies babble away, learning the art of conversation, as they explore mark making using paints. Toddlers gather around to listen to a story read by staff. They point to the pictures and talk about the story, developing their interest in literacy. Pre-school children squish and squeeze play dough; they use tools to roll it and cut out shapes. This develops strength in their hands in preparation for writing.

Children behave well. They play cooperatively together as they work as a team to complete puzzles. Staff promote positive behaviour effectively and children learn to follow their boundaries and rules. Children demonstrate a good understanding of these when they move from one part of the daily routine to another with ease. For example, they line up patiently to walk to the main hall together. Children learn that their behaviour has an impact on others when staff support them to share equipment.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Children with special educational needs and/or disabilities are supported extremely well. Staff work with external professionals and parents in a cohesive manner to give children the focused support they need. Staff receive training from outside specialists, which allows them to implement effective strategies. This helps to improve outcomes for children and they progress to the next stage of their education exceptionally well.
- Staff demonstrate a thorough understanding of their key children. They know what they can do and what they need to do next to make progress. They use children's interests effectively to plan activities that excite children and help them to progress. For example, children enjoy decorating ice lollies in an arts and crafts session as a result of a group discussion about the summer. At times during in these planned activities, staff do not always allow children to follow their own creative ideas.
- Children are well prepared for the transition to school. They develop independence skills, such as self-care and serving their own snack. They practise school routines such as focused learning on the carpet, so they are ready for school. Transition reports are prepared, and children develop relationships with their new teachers before they start school. This enables children to manage the transition to school smoothly.
- Staff establish close working partnerships with parents. They keep parents fully informed of their children's progress and development through regular



discussions and consultations. A parent representative provides a strong voice for communication between the manager and parents. Parents speak very highly of the provision and would highly recommend the nursery to other families.

- Children have good opportunities to progress in their physical development. For instance, they explore different ways that they can move their bodies in regular yoga sessions. Children master riding tricycles with pedals in the outdoor area and develop balancing skills as they walk across obstacle equipment. However, at present, the babies have a limited space for movement and exploration outside.
- Staff speak highly of the manager. They comment how they feel valued and well supported by her. They work cohesively together to ensure the nursery runs smoothly. The manager has a good oversight of her staff team, and their well-being is important. Regular supervision sessions are provided where positive feedback, training needs and any concerns are discussed. This allows any emerging issues to be addressed and guickly managed.
- Children develop good communication and language skills. Staff take every opportunity to extend language. They introduce new words to the youngest children and engage older children in meaningful conversations. Children talk about different types of weather, and how it makes them feel. They describe enjoying building snowmen when it is cold.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

Staff have a good knowledge and understanding of how to safeguard children. Staff are aware of how to report any concerns, including allegations made against staff. The manager ensures that staff's knowledge is secure with regular quizzes and updates shared in team meetings. Risk assessments are completed daily in the setting to ensure the equipment and resources are safe. Staff are deployed in all areas to ensure that children are always supervised, inside and outside. The manager has robust recruitment processes to ensure that those who are employed have the necessary suitability checks.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To further improve the quality of the early years provision, the provider should:

- provide more opportunities for children to follow their own creative ideas, particularly in planned activities
- enhance outdoor areas for babies to enable them to explore freely in their environment.

Inspection activities

- The manager joined the inspector on a learning walk. She talked to the inspector about the curriculum.
- The inspector observed the quality of education being provided, indoors and outdoors. She discussed children's progress with staff.
- The manager and the inspector carried out a joint observation in the pre-school room.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation. This included evidence of staff suitability, supervision records and safeguarding documents.
- The inspector spoke to parents during the inspection and took account of written views.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
