Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has completed further safeguarding training since her last inspection. This has developed her knowledge of safeguarding. She is able to talk about the processes she would follow if she has concerns about a child in her care. The childminder has a sufficient knowledge of the allegations process. This helps to protect children from harm.
- The childminder understands how to provide an appropriate curriculum. She talks about the activities that she provides for children. She explains how she promotes children's learning. For instance, by helping them become more independent, so they are well prepared to start school.
- Parents report they are happy with the provision. They comment that the childminder is 'brilliant'. The childminder recognises the importance of working closely with parents, for instance, to help children develop their self-care skills. She discusses how she provides information to parents to support children's learning and development at home.
- The childminder recognises the need to build good relationships with children to help them behave well. Older children demonstrate good behaviour. They show positive attitudes to learning as they carry the water to the sand tray. They make the sand damp enough to build their models and play happily.
- The childminder understands how to support children's physical development. She explains that she encourages them to be active in her garden. Children can choose from a variety of activities to support this area of learning.
- The childminder is aware of her responsibility to keep her professional knowledge updated. She explains how she does this, such as by using online resources.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
