Monitoring visit

Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This home is privately owned and provides care for up to three children who may have experienced childhood instability leading to trauma and associated complex behaviours.

The home has been without a registered manager since June 2021

Inspection date: 19 July 2022

This monitoring visit

Ofsted visited the home to complete a full inspection on 20 and 21 April 2022. At the inspection, serious and widespread failures were found that meant children were not protected or their welfare promoted. The home was judged inadequate.

Due to the significant concerns found during the inspection, Ofsted issued 13 requirements and two compliance notices, under regulation 12 (the protection of children standard) and regulation 13 (the leadership and management standard).

Ofsted also suspended the home's registration. This means that no children can live in the home while the suspension notice is in place.

A monitoring visit took place on 7 June 2022. At that visit, the inspector found that some improvement had been made and the requirements under regulations 11, 12, 23, 26 and 40 were found to be met. One compliance notice, under regulation 12 (the protection of children standard) had also been met. However, shortfalls remained in some aspects of leadership and management. As a result, the compliance notice was issued again under regulation 13 (the leadership and management standard). The home's registration remained suspended.

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On 4 July 2022, a further monitoring visit took place to review the notice of suspension, compliance notice and requirements.

During that visit the inspector found that further improvements had been made and the compliance notice under regulation 13 (the leadership and management standard) was considered to be met. A requirement under regulation 33 was also considered to be met.

The home was not safe or suitably furnished for children to live there. At the time of the visit, there was no furniture in the lounge and dining areas. Planned redecoration of the children's bathroom had not yet finished and there were large piles of broken furniture in the rear garden. Because of these concerns, the home's registration remained suspended.

A further monitoring visit took place on 19 July 2022 due to Ofsted being informed by the provider that action had been taken and the home was now a safe environment for children to live in. Ofsted visited the home to review the environment and the notice of suspension.

The home continues to have no permanent manager. Leaders are active in their efforts to recruit a suitable manager. An interim manager stays in day-to-day charge of the home until a permanent manager is recruited.

Maintenance work is now complete. Improvements to all areas of the home have been carried out. For example, a new bathroom suite has been fitted to the first floor of the home. New furniture has been purchased and is situated within the lounge and dining areas. Staff have tidied the gardens and removed all the rubbish and broken furniture that was present during the last visit. The home now can provide a safe and inviting environment for children to call home.

Following this monitoring visit, Ofsted believe that the provider has shown that they can safely admit children, therefore, the notice of suspension has been lifted. The requirement under regulation 6 is considered to have been met. Requirements under regulations 8, 10, 14, 28 and 35 have not been reviewed during this monitoring visit.
