Summary of key findings

This provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not have valid public liability insurance in place to meet current requirements to keep children safe.
- The childminder meets the requirements in relation to Disclosure and Barring Service checks and a valid paediatric first-aid certificate.
- The childminder understands how to teach children about difference. For example, the childminder would ensure that all children would have equal access to all toys and resources, regardless of gender, race, disability, culture. She would read stories to children to reflect different family compositions, races and cultures.
- During discussion, the childminder showed how she would work successfully with parents to promote best outcomes for children. For example, she would be responsive to parents in terms of how they would like to be kept up to date on children's progress, such as written notes or daily conversations.
- The childminder understands how to support children's good progress. For example, she would provide older children with different types of creative activities, such as finger painting and collage materials to glue to paper. For younger children, she would give them a wide range of textures and materials to explore.
- During discussions, the childminder recognised the importance of evaluating her practice. For example, she would take time to consider the impact of different activities on children's learning and make amendments as required. She has set herself suitable goals, such as to continue to develop ways to support children's physical development.
- The childminder knows how to help children to develop healthy lifestyles. For instance, she would ensure that all meals and snacks were well balanced and nutritious and that children have daily opportunities to practise their physical skills using a variety of equipment and resources.
- During discussions, the childminder showed a clear understanding of different signs and symptoms to look out for, which may show that a child could be at risk of abuse, such as neglect. She knows how to report her concerns to keep children safe.
- The childminder understands how to manage children's behaviour effectively. For instance, she would introduce positive group rules and explain why some behaviour is not acceptable.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- This was the first routine inspection the childminder received since the COVID-19 pandemic began. The inspector discussed the impact of the pandemic with the childminder and has taken this into account in their evaluation of the setting.
- The inspector viewed the premises, toys and resources with the childminder. She talked with the childminder about how she will use these to promote children's learning.
- The inspector viewed relevant documentation, which included the childminder's paediatric first-aid qualification, and Disclosure and Barring Service checks for adults living in the home.
- The inspector spoke with the childminder to find out how she would use experiences and activities to support children's learning and development.
- The inspector talked with the childminder about her safeguarding knowledge and how she will keep children safe.



We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
