What is it like to attend this early years setting?

This provision meets requirements

Children understand how to behave at the camp. Staff use explanations and gentle reminders to help children manage their emotions and consider others. For example, each morning new children are identified immediately and greeted by attentive staff, who make extra effort to ensure they settle quickly. This helps children to learn how to behave well and familiarise themselves with the camp's rules. This supports children to become confident and resilient individuals.

The atmosphere in the camp is positive and children respond well to familiar routines, games, and activities. For example, children sit in a circle and enjoy playing, 'duck, duck, goose,' in the large hall, tapping their friends on their shoulders. Children who are new to the club receive effective support from their key person. This helps children to form friendships and feel happy and secure.

Children's physical development and well-being are well supported. They are inspired by the core principles of the camp to create an approach of 'fun, learn and move'. Staff provide plenty of opportunities for children to exercise on a daily basis. For example, children enjoy a range of ball, racquet and running games, with age-appropriate resources to practise their physical skills. Children enjoy running freely on the soft outdoor play surface and exploring the outdoor equipment, such as the climbing frame and slide.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Leaders have addressed the previous actions since the last inspection. They are ambitious and have a clear vision for the camp. Leaders support staff to work towards this effectively. For instance, new staff benefit from a structured induction programme. They shadow more experienced staff to learn about their role and the behaviours they are expected to model when interacting with children. Staff say that they feel well supported in their roles.
- Staff identify that due to the COVID-19 pandemic, some children need support to help them interact with others during games. Staff help children to overcome this. For example, they demonstrate how to invite others to play and include them in games. Staff provide sensitive support to help children resolve problems that they encounter. Children then go on to practise these strategies independently. This is helping them learn to manage their own behaviour.
- Partnerships with parents are strong and highly effective. Staff ensure that parents remain continually up to date about children's ongoing care. They use effective communication methods to share information with them about children's activities and achievements.
- Staff support children to follow good hygiene practices, such as washing their



hands prior to meals and snacks. Children understand the routines and remember to tell a member of staff when they are going to go to the toilet, to support their safety and security.

- The programme of activities for the holiday camp is carefully considered to take account of children's interests. This means they really enjoy time spent in the camp with their friends. Overall, children remain occupied in their chosen activities throughout the session. However, during some large-group sessions, there is scope to further improve this, so that all children are fully engaged and do not tire and lose interest.
- Children's individual needs are carefully considered and met effectively. Staff support children with special educational needs and/or disabilities well. For example, they have knowledge of the very specific needs of each child and work closely with parents.
- The camp provides children with a real focus on leading a healthy lifestyle. Staff encourage conversation about the benefits of healthy food on children's bodies, and children understand the importance of a healthy lifestyle. For example, staff remind children of the importance of rehydrating after undertaking physical exercise and how certain foods can provide them with energy.
- Good arrangements are in place to support children who speak English as an additional language. Staff find out about children's home language vocabulary. They use visual picture prompts and simple signing, to support children's language development.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

Staff have a secure understanding of how to safeguard children. They recognise signs and symptoms that would cause them to be concerned for a child's welfare. Staff know how to identify children that may be exposed to extreme views. Staff know how to report any concerns they may have about any children or the adults they encounter. Staff ensure children are closely supervised, both indoors and outdoors. For instance, staff know where children are and what they are doing in the large indoor and outdoor space. The staff recruitment process is robust and staff's suitability is regularly reviewed to check they remain suitable to work with children.

Inspection activities
